Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO MARCH 24.

Chicago, March 23—Pike's Opera House, in Cincinnati, was totally destroyed by fire last night. The Enquirer office and adjoining buildings on Fourth street, were also burned. It was the most destructive fire that ever visited Cincinnati. Loss \$500,000.

The Ohio Senate has passed the eight hour bill with trifling amendments, and if they are agreed to by the House, the bill becomes a law July 1st. It makes eight hours a legal day's work.

The Rhode Island Union Convention, which nominated Gen. Burnside for Governor, put forward no platform, and the Democrats have decided not to nominate a ticket because of a split in the Union ranks. The other wing will probably nominate the present Governor Smith for re election.

The friends of Colorado do not despair of securing the admission of that territory to the Union, by this Congress. An effort will be made to renew the direct attempt. If this fails, an effort will be made to admit Colorado and Nebraska by one act. Perhaps Montana will be ready to come in by that time.

The committee on weights, measures and coinage, recommend to Congress to authorize and encourage by law, the admission and use of the metrical system of weights and measures, and that with a view to familiarize the people with the system, that provision be made by law for the immediate distribution to custom houses and States of metrical standard of weights and measures, and also to introduce the system into post-offices, by making a single letter weight fifteen grammes, and to cause the new cent pieces to be so coined that they shall weigh each ten grammes and that their diameters shall be made to bear a determinate and similar ratio to the metrical unit of length.

Georgia newspapers publish a rumor that there will soon be held a convention of colored people at Augusta, for the purpose of nominating representatives to Congress from the territory of Georgia.

The Secretary of War informs Congress in answer to the resolution, that on January 6th there were 152,611 men in the service, namely: regulars, 26,588; white volunteers, 57,593; colored, 65,766; staff officers, etc., 1,700. Orders have been issued for a further reduction of 18,654 whites and 2,300 colored.

In Congress last Monday a communication was received from Secretary Seward, inclosing a letter from Messrs. Brewer & Co., relating to a bill for service in bringing to Honolulu from the Ascension Islands 68 American seamen, left there by the pirate *Shenandoah*. The bill is for \$3,530 in gold, which the Secretary thinks should be promptly paid.

THE VANCOUVER QUARTZ LEDGE.—The excitement in regard to the discovery of a gold bearing quartz ledge near Vancouver continues unabated. Specimens of the rock have been sent to Portland for assay. The *Oregonian* says:

The rock bears unmistakable signs of containing gold, and we should not be surprised if it proved to contain quicksilver. 600 pounds of the ore will be tested at the battery of the Oregon Iron Works, probably to day. Until we can learn something of these results of course we are unable to give an idea of the value of the discovery, but allowing it to be worth \$10 per ton—one-third as rich as practical miners estimate it—the result of working it must be enormous. There are already four companies organized for developing the ledge, which is fully as extensive as reported yesterday, and extensions are being taken up and recorded about as fast as the clerks can make out the papers.

The *Herald* says the rock will yield \$20 per ton. We hope this is so.

ANOTHER EARTHQUAKE.—Yesterday's Portland papers announce another earthquake as having visited San Francisco. It was felt at San Jose, Gilroy, and other interior towns. Chimneys were thrown down and other slight damages done, but owing to the telegraph being out of order no particulars are given.
