THE Imperial army, in Mexico, is reported to be 20,000 effective men.

THE telegraph company have completed the laying of their new cable across the Willamette, at Portland.

THE first "clean up" of the Wide Awake, on Red Warrior Gulch, South Boise, this year, after a run of only twelve days, yielded \$10,000.

JUST IN TIME—Yesterday we received a copy of the San Francisco Call, dated February 28th, being only one month old when it came to hand.

CALEB LYON, Governor of Idaho, subscribed \$500, of his own private funds, to the Indian fund which has been gotten up for the extermination or driving out of the Indians of that section.

FITZ HUGH LUDLOW, a writer of considerable ability, author of the "Hasheesh Papers," and of the rather extravagant series of papers in the Atlantic Monthly, from this part of the world, is reported insane.

COLUMBIA RIVER MINES.—The Walla Walla Statesman says that seven-eighths of the business transacted there this season has been on account of the Columbia River mines. There will be a rush in that direction when Capt. White's boat is ready to start, the accessibility of these mines giving them a preference over the Blackfoot country.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A man named Louis Lobeids was found dead in his bed, at the Columbia Hotel, in this city, yesterday morning. He is supposed to have died in a fit of nightmare, to which he was peculiarly subject. But a few days before his death he remarked to a friend of his, that he "would be found dead some morning," stating that at times he had most frightful and painful dreams. He was apparently in perfect good health the night previous.

UNION MASS MEETING.—As our friends the Democrats would not consent to let our city election take place without making a party issue of it, and have, by nominating a strict party ticket, in a manner debarred our citizens from exercising their choice of City officers without regard to politics; the Union men, whom we trust they will grant equal privileges, propose to nominate and support a citizen's ticket, for which purpose a mass meeting is called to convene at the Court House this evening.

"FEET" IN NEW YORK.—We met recently a gentleman just from the eastern States, where he had been in the interest of some of the many quartz ledges in Idaho, which one we now forget, and in the conversation with him we found it to be his opinion that it was useless attempting to induce eastern capitalists to invest in the development of our mineral resources, unless they can be persuaded to send reliable agents to this country who must themselves go upon the ground and realize with their eyes the facts. The following from the Idaho World of the 17th inst. is nearly to the same effect:

A friend writes us from New York that there are a large number of Idaho quartz men there who are attempting to make sales, but they have so far found the business quite dull. He says those who have accumulated vast sums, have invested them in Government, Oil, Railroad and other stocks, and don't seem to have a very great disposition to embark in quartz. There are some of the very best leads in Idaho Territory here for sale, and it is astonishing to me that men will make investments in the stocks above mentioned, and have so great a disinclination to invest in the quartz which is here for sale.

Dr. Hawthorne is here with a part of the Atlanta, in the Yuba district—also Jessie Benton, Grey Eagle, and Willamette, some of the best interests in the Territory—also with a large number of leads in Flint District, Owyhee county.

One great cause of an indisposition to invest is that certain persons have been on here and sold wild cat, and made a character of representation, which has misled companies as to expenses, mode of working mines, time at which results would likely be obtained, &c.

CAPT. A. W. WATERS of the 1st Oregon Infantry, commanding officer at Fort Lapwai, called on us yesterday evening. He is down on business connected with the Fort and the Indian Agency at that point, and will take a flying trip into Web-foot to see his friends before he returns. He says that a company of cavalry are badly needed at Lapwai in order to prevent the whites from having improper intercourse with the Indians. That the Indians on the reserve are mostly Nez Perces, are disposed to be well behaved and that if whisky and cultus whites can be kept off the reserve it will be a success.

"OWYHEE."—The district of Owyhee, says the Honolulu Advertiser, was so christened by a couple of Hawaiians, who were in the employ of the Hudson Bay Company, and lived there trading with the neighboring Indians. They little thought then that the section would become famous as a gold mining region, and the name is likely to be perpetuated there, but it is not properly spelled. Owyhee will do.

Old stories of the war are constantly coming to light. It is stated that when General Bragg was in command of Augusta, Georgia, last winter, Jeff. Davis telegraphed to him "to hold the State at all hazards, stop up the roads, destroy the supplies and crush Sherman." At the close of the dispatch, the rebel President inquired, "What is your available force for this purpose?" General Bragg promptly replied, "Five proclamations and one brigade."
