Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO MARCH 24.

Cincinnati, March 24.—Pike's Opera House is entirely in ruins. The *Enquirer* office is also destroyed. The fire spread across Baker street to the Adams Express stables, and several buildings on 3d street. The Express Company saved their valuable packages, but everything else was lost. The total loss will reach \$2,000,000; Pike's loss being \$10,000, on which he had but a trifling insurance. It is supposed the fire was caused by an explosion of gas.

New York, March 24.—Last evening the residence of John P. Moore, No. 100 Madison Avenue, was robbed of a tin box containing \$100,000 in United States securities. A reward of \$5,000 is offered.

Nothing further has been divulged about the robbery of \$1,500,000 from Lord's office, but mysterious advertisements lead to the belief that negotiations have been opened for compromise with the mysterious thief.

The Postmaster of Hartford, Conn., tendered his resignation, which the President refused to accept.

In pursuance of general instructions from the headquarters of the army, officers in command of military departments were established quarantines at Southern ports, and suitable vessels for guard ships are being stationed along the coast as security against the introduction of cholera.

New York, March 24.—In the U. S. District Court yesterday Judge Botts pronounced an elaborate judgment, in which he declared that the application of the owners of the steamship *Meteor* for bonding that vessel should be refused, out of a sense of obligation to enforce neutrality. It will be remembered that the *Meteor* was seized by order of the Government on information that she was intended to be used as a Chilean privateer. Pending the final decision the owners wanted to give bonds for the value of the vessel and release her from further detention.

New York, March 24.—The *Commercial Advertiser* says the passage of the Loan bill by the House has produced a slight fluctuation in the market. The adoption of the clause authorizing a foreign loan took Wall street by surprise, and the bill is regarded as granting the Secretary substantially all the power he wanted. The action of the House would produce a more marked effect were it certain the bill would pass the Senate in its present form. There is doubt if the Senate will not insist on curtailing the Secretary's power.

Washington, March 24.—Seth Williams, the well known Adj. Gen. of the Army of the Potomac, died at the residence of his sister in this city last night, of inflammation of the brain.

Cincinnati, March 24.—The *Commercial* gives prominence to the statement that leading members of Congress have agreed to continue in session till the 4th of March, and will take a recess from time to time as occasion may require, leaving a few members on hand to keep up the formality.

Washington, March 24.—The House went into the Committee of the Whole for general debate. The attendance was small. The proceedings were not important.

The President's veto of the civil rights bill will probably be sent to the Senate on Monday, and it is anticipated with much interest. Various speculations are afloat regarding the probabilities of the message, and while nothing is certainly known, it seems to be believed the President will reiterate the argument of the other veto message against legislation for the South while those States are unrepresented. He will avail himself of this occasion to further define his policy.

The President yesterday expressed his disapprobation of Senator Stewart's proposition providing for universal amnesty on condition that the States shall grant universal suffrage.

Chicago, March 26.—The Democratic city convention of Milwaukee, nominated Mayor Talmadge for re-election; declared its unqualified approval of the President's policy, and endorsed the patriotic course of Senator Doolittle.

General Palmer, commanding the Department of Kentucky, has tendered his resignation, but it is not accepted yet.

During the debate in Congress the other day, on the bill to protect army officers from vexatious suits for damages in Southern States, it was stated that 3,500 such suits had been commenced in Kentucky alone.

Returns from all but seven townships in New Hampshire, show a majority for Union candidate for Governor of 48 against 42.

It is rumored that a formal misunderstanding exists between the English Government and the American Embassy in London, relative to the imprisonment of the several persons charged with Fenianism, who assert their claims to be African citizens, and demand to be either liberated or brought to

trial. The misunderstanding has been referred to Washington for solution, and may prove embarrassing.

Senators Foote and Dixon are both better, but no hopes are entertained of the permanent recovery of either.

San Francisco, March 26.—A smart shock of an earthquake visited the city at 12:15 p. m. to-day. It was the most vivid reminder of the October shake we have had since that date, and sent quite a number of citizens into the street.
