**AFRAY AT CANYON CITY.**—We have received a letter from Canyon City dated the 24th inst., which says that on the 23d inst. two men named John Grubb and C. Barr Smith had a dispute and quarrel there, in which words, blows and finally pistols were used by both parties, that they then clinched, and that Grubb was shot in the groin while in the act of gouging out Smith's eye. Grubb died in about an hour afterwards.

We would remark that we presume the above is correct, but that the letter from which we get the information is without a signature, being dated the 24th inst., the morning on which the stage probably left, the writer may have inadvertently omitted his signature. In this connection let us say that newspapers are always very anxious to get hold of every species of intelligence as soon as possible, and that we are very thankful to any person who may furnish us an item, but that we always like to know that what we publish is reliable and correct. In this case the evident intelligence of the writer is all that prevented us from casting the letter aside.

Since the above was in type we learn from a gentleman who came down on the stage that these facts are substantially correct, and that Mr. Smith had been arrested, examined and acquitted, the homicide being considered justifiable.

**STAGE ACCIDENT.**—The Canyon City stage in attempting to cross the South Fork of the John Day's last Sunday, capsized. Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasure box, some baggage belonging to the passengers were lost, and only with difficulty were the horses and passengers saved. The stream was very high and rapid, and shortly after driving on the stage swung round and turned over, the horses swam to and climbed the opposite bank and everybody got out the best way they could. The passengers with the assistance of some packers who were camped near at hand, and who throw ropes to those still on the wagon, pulled the stage up bodily over a high bank against which it lodged. The amount of treasure lost is not known, and cannot be until word is received from the agency at Canyon City.

**REMEDY FOR CATTLE POISON.**—A farmer of Washington Territory says, through the Vancouver Register, that an effectual remedy for cases of cattle poison from eating early spring vegetation, is a table spoonful of quick lime to a grown animal, and less in proportion to the age, to be repeated in twenty-four hours where the first dose proves insufficient.

**CANYON CITY.**—On account of high water in the canyon, and damages to the ditches, the miners at Canyon City were doing very little when the stage left; but repairs to the ditches are going forward rapidly.

From the Middle Fork, the news is good—the hill diggings generally are turning out well.

**THE CORONER'S JURY** in the case of the man Lobeide, whose death we mentioned yesterday, returned a verdict that he died in an epileptic fit.

## UNION MASS MEETING.

At a meeting of the citizens and Union voters of Dalles City, held at the Court House on last evening, the 29th inst., Capt. Lyon was called to the Chair and Mr. H. L. Chapin chosen Secretary.

On motion a committee of five were appointed to recommend a ticket for city officers at the ensuing election.—The Chair appointed the following gentlemen on the committee: G. W. Waldron, J. R. Robbins, L. Coffin, C. B. Koegel and W. Lord.

The committee reported as follows: For Mayor, G. B. Gilman; for Recorder, H. Catley; for Treasurer, Chas. S. Miller; for Marshal, Chas. Keeler, and for Councilmen, R. H. Wood, Geo. Liebe, D. Handley, I. S. McFarland and E. Wingate.

After considerable balloting the above ticket was sustained, and on motion declared unanimously nominated.

On motion the Secretary was ordered to furnish the MOUNTAINEER with a copy of the proceedings for publication.

**RECENTLY** at Dayton and in other parts of the State strange pieces of fossil remains have been found, to which the newspapers have called considerable attention.

Regarding them the Rev. Mr. Condon of this city, than whom science has not a more sincere lover, thus writes to the Oregonian, and we commend his remarks to the careful attention of everybody who possess any specimens of this nature, hoping that all such may be retained in our midst and that at no very distant day they may be gathered together, where they will be of use to the student and entertainment to the curious:

"Permit me, Mr. Editor, to call added attention to those fossil bones which you noticed a few days since:

Cannot the people of Portland, who take a permanent interest in her public spirit, be induced to make some arrangement with General Palmer by which those fossils may be kept in Oregon?

Portland or Salem certainly ought to keep them for the instruction of our own young people. In either place these fossils might be made the beginning of a State collection. Cannot your library association purchase them and let the cabinet begin at once in their rooms?

I would offer the following reasons to dissuade General Palmer from sending those fossils away from our State:

1. The colleges and museums of the East have no such need of them that we have.

They have whole skeletons and part skeletons in several of the Eastern cities. The Smithsonian Institute has specimens from many parts of the country.

Oregon needs her own fossils for the instruction of her own youth. Our young men ought not to be compelled to go to some Eastern city to learn what a tooth or tusk or a bone of a Mastodon is.

2. The scientific world will learn of and publish the fact of the discovery of these fossils without sending the specimens themselves away.

3. Nearly all of the older States have their own State collection. We need ours. If we ever get one, it will be unfortunate that these Dayton specimens are not among them.
