DATES TO MARCH 27.

Chicago, March 27.—The bill increasing the number of Cadets at West Point, will be reported in a few days. New York, March 27.—The Herald's Portland, Me., special dispatch says: There was a very large and enthusiastic Fenian demonstration last evening. The procession, as it passed the People House, was watched with much interest by the Provincials there assembled. The Acrostock paper denies that the Fenians in the eastern section of the State intend to invade the neighboring province of New Brunswick.

The Senate military committee, yesterday passed upon a large number of applications for military promotions and assignments of West Point Cadets to the regular army, which will be acted upon at the next executive session of the Senate.

The sum of \$385,000 in fractional currency was yesterday delivered by the printing division of the Treasury Department.

The World's Washington dispatch says the ways and means committee are preparing another tax bill, in which they propose to put such articles as ought to be placed on the free list. The only measure that the committee has ready to report is one putting a tax of five cents per pound on cotton. To-day, however, they expect to settle some of the other matters, and next week report the bill to the House.

The Senate military committee, yesterday authorized Mr. Nesmith to report a bill in favor of reimbursing the State of Western Virginia for the money expended in raising and transporting troops during the rebellion, to the amount of \$300,000.

The case of the Meteor, the alleged Chilean privateer, was up yesterday in the U. S. District Court, and the case comes on again to-day.

An exhibition of the game of billiards took place last evening at the Cooper Institute.—The players were Roberts, the English champion, Kavanaugh, Deery, Cahill, Fray and Foster. There were four games played, in two of which Roberts was victorious against Kavanaugh and Deery respectively. Cahill beat him at the French carom game.

The presiding officers of the different Trades Union societies held a meeting in this city for the purpose of making arrangements for having a grand National Convention of the Trades Societies, and the U. S. credentials to be presented from the representatives of the 20,000 members of the Trades Unions of the country at large. Resolutions were adopted, and a committee appointed to make the necessary preparations for the convention.

New York, March 27.—The Herald's Rio Janeiro correspondent writes respecting affairs in Brazil, and the progress of war between the allies and the Paraguayans. The grand attack of the former is not yet expected to be made, but the two hostile forces have confronted each other on the opposite side of the Parana river, and it is reported that the allied army would cross the river, about the middle of February, preparatory to a formidable assault on the Paraguayan stronghold.

Washington, March 27.—The Republican asserts that the President has laid up for prosecution the cases of five hundred of the principal participants in the rebellion, whom he holds for the purpose of justice.

Washington, March 27.—President Johnson submitted a veto message to the Senate to-day, on the civil rights bill. The message was not, up to this hour, 1:30 p. m., been read.

Senator Foote, of Vermont, is supposed to be in a dying condition this noon.

San Francisco, March 27.—N. Willis Coles, gentleman well known in this city, and formerly book keeper in the office of ex-heriff Doane, met with a most horrible death a few minutes past eight o'clock this morning, at the station of the San Jose railroad, on Fourth street. Mr. Coles was about to take passage on the eight o'clock train for Redwood City, and while standing on the platform talking to Mr. Newhall, President of the road, the train started. In attempting to jump upon the cars he accidentally fell between it and the platform, and being caught by the moving train, was crushed in the most horrible manner, his body being carried by the train and twisted several times around until it was pressed into a space more than six inches in width. Before the train stopped his body had been crushed from the legs up to the breast. The planks on the platform had to be sawed out before he could be removed.
