The Olympia Standard says that place can boast of the best sidewalks and streets on the Pacific Coast.

The gold and silver product of Montana for the past year is reported by the U. S. Collector to have been \$16,000,000.

The Lewistonians claim to have found the shortest and best route to the Blackfoot country. Of course one end of the route is at Lewiston.

The steam tug Rabonni, which has been endeavoring to build up a business for itself at the mouth of the Columbia, has been withdrawn by the owners, and taken to San Francisco. They allege that there was a combination against them.

DON'T LIKE IT.—Our Democratic friends who, in their persistence in nominating a strict party ticket, have proved that they think nobody but a Democrat fit to hold any office, and have forced the Union men to put another ticket in the field, pretend that they don't like the way in which the Union Mass Meeting was conducted. We wonder how they like the Citizens' Ticket? Guess they don't like that either.

For the information of some parties, who do not appear to know it, we would state that the White Bluffs route advertised in another column, lies entirely on the north side of the Columbia river. Parties intending to go that way to the mines should cross the river here, and ferry it again at White Bluffs. Several trains have already gone that way. On account of the hills nearly all having a southern exposure, the grass will be earlier on that route than on any other.

JAS. O'MERA, editor of the Albany State's Rights Democrat, in the last issue of that journal publishes a personal article of over a column in length, the upshot of which is that Dr. J. B. Lee of Corvallis has charged O'Mera with having accepted money as a reward for his political course during the coming canvass, which O'Mera denies, and publicly proclaims that Dr. Lee will give him no satisfaction, and that Dr. L. is a liar. That's a "figtin word" as the boys say.

RED TAPE.—At a recent settlement of the accounts of a collector and disbursing agent of the Government, named Foote, he was found to have a balance due him of two cents, he received a check as follows:

"Draft 2,950 on Treasury warrant, Treasury of the United States. No. 1,954. Washington, January 8th, 1866. At sight pay Erastus Foote, collector and disbursing agent, or order, two cents—F. E. Spinner, Treasurer of the United States. Recorded January 8th, 1866. S. B. Colby, Register of the Treasury. Assistant Treasurer U. S., Boston, Mass."

On this important document there were seven signatures, and all for two cents. The gentleman who owned the draft was offered a dollar for it, but said he would not sell it for five dollars.

IDAHO ITEMS.—We are indebted to Maj. Glenn, U. S. A., for a copy of the Idaho Statesman of the 22d inst., from which we get the following items:

Travel is increasing. Two stages came in from the west on Tuesday, loaded, and another yesterday. The line will, hereafter, be run daily to and from Umatilla.

The valley was visited night before last with a most beautiful rain. It will serve to bring forward the newly sown crops in fine style. The grain prospects look very encouraging indeed this season, and there is being a large amount sown.

Captains Walker and Collins, Lieut. Pepon, Dr. Cochran, and thirty men start again this morning for Indians anywhere they can find them, no matter whether on the Owyhee, Malheur, or any other place. Captain Walker will get twenty five additional men at Camp Lyon. The citizens of Boise City most heartily wish them success.

The theatre is doing a good business, Mrs Getzler being the principal star.

The Avalanche complains that by some unauthorized interference, the money spent in raising the Ada county volunteers have been worse than thrown away, and the protection which might have resulted from the organization have been lost to the public.

GOLD AND SILVER SMELTING PROCESS. The Pacific Tribune describes a new invention for extracting gold and silver thus:

The discovery is simple, having a blast or cupola furnace, constructed the same as those used for smelting iron from the ore. This process melts all the gold, silver, copper and lead in one mass, which is drawn off and moulded into ingots, which may be freighted to New York or San Francisco, where the different metals are easily separated. By this process all the valuable metals that the quartz may contain is obtained the same as by fire assay. There being no patent on this, any person is at liberty to use the same. Mr. John Clark, of this place, (Olympia,) has a furnace of this description, with horse-power blast, which cost about three hundred dollars, and will hold one ton of rock.—When melted, the metal can be drawn off every twelve hours. Thus, it will be apparent to all that this new process, if successfully put in operation, is calculated to give impetus to quartz mining in this country, and gives the poor miner a chance as well as the rich. Mr. Laman says in his letter to his brother, that ore in Colorado, that paid \$50 per ton, with the stamp mill, pays \$300 per ton with the furnace. This great difference is owing to the metal being in sulphates.

THE VANCOUVER QUARTZ LEDGE.—Hatched eggs don't turn out quite as well as some expect. The Vancouver quartz discovery is now a question, as will appear by the following from yesterday's Herald:

OUR neighbors at Vancouver are truly exercised relative to the discovery of quartz in their vicinity. Divines and laymen appear to be engaged in a grand scramble to see who will get the best location in which to secure a fortune. Last Sunday evening the congregation in a certain church in Vancouver, after sitting an hour over time waiting for the Domini, were informed by a lay member that the Reverend gentleman had not yet returned from the mines! and recommended that the congregation resolve itself into a prayer meeting, which was no sooner suggested than adopted. The editors and printers are in the

same category, and the notice "Gone to the mines" is on the editor's sanctum and office doors. Assays of this wondrous ledge have been made; but not coming up to the expectations of those interested, other tests are yet to be made. We hope our friends will find some good and lasting ledges in their vicinity, but they must get some different looking rock before they can lay claim to any quartz discovery of value.
