Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO MARCH 31.

Chicago, March 30.—A bill making eight hours a legal day's work passed the Wisconsin House of Representatives on Wednesday, 23th, by 50 and 36. Next day the vote was reconsidered, and the bill postponed till the 4th of July, by 54 against 43, thus killing the measure. The Wisconsin House of Representatives also adopted a resolution submitting to the people the question of calling a constitutional convention.

Washington, March 31.—The statement of the public debt, which will be published next week, will not show any reduction of the debt. No new issues nor conversions having been made since the last statement, but will show a large increase in the funds.

It is expected that the civil rights bill will be taken up in the Senate on Monday, when Mr. Trumbull will make a speech reviewing the President's objections, and other Senators may also speak. There is much active speculation about two or three doubtful Senators, and an ugly rumor is afloat concerning one not hitherto considered doubtful.

New York, March 31.—The Tribune's special dispatch says orders have been issued to muster out all the colored troops the 1st of March.

Washington, March 31.—The prominent Republican candidates for the New Jersey Senate, are A. G. Cotell and James A. Scoville. The following dispatch was received by Scoville during his speech in the New Jersey Senate yesterday, dated Washington, March 29:

To Hon. James M. Scoville—By all means hurry up the election. Give us no Conservatives; a Radical like yourself or nothing. A copperhead is better than a twiddler.

The rumors circulating here, that Scoville had sold out to the Democrats were not believed, but on the other hand, that he will insist on the election of a radical or no body.

Chicago, March 21.—The Wisconsin Senate passed the House resolutions, submitting to the people the question of calling a Constitutional Convention.

Jesse D. Bright has re appeared in Indiana politics, endorsing the President's policy, and is a candidate for re-election to the Senate, vice Henry S. Lane.

New York, March 31.—In the case of recent Distillery frauds on internal revenue in this city, some very heavy assessments have been made, one or two as high as \$150,000, but the defaulters profess their inability to meet the demands of the Government. Compromises will probably be made in some cases, but none of the civil suits will be relinquished. The Newark Advertiser says Senator Wright is still confined to his house, and it is doubtful if he ever resumes his seat in the Senate.

New York, March 30.—Advices from the seat of war on the Parana river, state that on January 21st, a Paraguayan force of 3,000 crossed to the southern bank, had a battle with the allied vanguard, destroyed a large accumulation of timber which the allies were collecting to make rafts; and retired in good order. The Brazilian fleet remained at Carrientes awaiting the arrival of the Admiral, when operations would be commenced. But it is believed the obstructions in the river are so complete that the vessels will not be able to do much.

Washington, March 30.—The Navy Department is sending a squadron to the fishing banks of New Foundland to protect American interests. No trouble is apprehended, but it is thought desirable to have a force on hand. Late London advices indicate that the British Government will not insist on driving American fishermen from those waters, though there may be some delay in establishing their rights after the abrogation of the reciprocity treaty.

Washington, March 30.—The Intelligencer says Gen. Terry has warned the colored people of Richmond, not to attempt so imprudent a course as their proposed celebration of the fall of Richmond on the 3d of April, but it appears the movers are still engaged in perfecting arrangements. It is needless to say that no demonstration will be permitted by the Government, and measures have been taken to prevent it.

The banking house of Duncan Sherman & Co., on William Street was on fire this morning. The building was but little injured, but considerable damage was done to the books, papers and furniture. The steamer Helvetia from Liverpool, landed 1,020 immigrants today. The \$20,000 and books stolen from Lord Hare have been recovered. The remainder it is expected will also be recovered.

The Austin, Texas, convention on the 28th passed a resolution to send Messrs. Porter, Hancock, Lane and Henderson as delegates to Washington.

The State election is to be held on the fourth Monday of June, and the legislature meets on the first Monday of August.

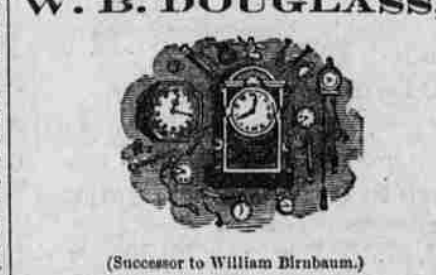
