Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO MARCH 31.

Washington, March 31.—The President has proclaimed a treaty of peace with the Black-foot and Dacotah Indians, similar to the treaties recently made with the Sioux bands, by which they pledge themselves to withdraw from the Overland routes, in consideration of receiving \$7,000 yearly for twenty years.

Baltimore, March 31.—A bishop Spaulding, under authority from Rome, has issued letters addressed to Archbishops and Bishops of the Catholic Church in the United States, convening them at Baltimore on the first Sunday of next October, to inaugurate the second Penary Council.

Cincinnati, March 29.—There is much feeling here among stockholders of the U. S. Telegraph Company, in regard to the action of the Trustees, and a meeting will be held in a day or two to consider what is to be done. Reports are current, and believed in well informed circles, that some Trustees made a large amount of money and rendered themselves liable to criminal prosecution.

Washington, March 29.—In the Senate, Mr. Sumner moved that a copy of the resolution in reference to Mr. Stockton be communicated to the Governor of New Jersey, which was adopted.

Mr. Poland, of Vermont, said he would ask the indulgence of the Senate to pronounce an eulogy on his late colleague, Mr. Foot, at a future time; he offered a resolution that the Senators wear the usual badge of mourning during the remainder of the session, which was adopted. Mr. Trumbull moved, at fifteen minutes past twelve o'clock that the Senate take a recess until 1 o'clock, at which hour the funeral services of Mr. Foot commenced. The galleries were densely crowded, and on the floor were the president and the members of his Cabinet, Gen. Grant, the Supreme Court Judges, members of the House and Diplomatic Corps, with officers of the Army and Navy. At one o'clock the corpse was brought in, escorted by the Committee of Arrangements, the following being the pall-bearers: Messrs. Feasenden, Haris, Johnson, Guthrie, Lane, of Indiana, and Sumner. Rev. Dr. Grey, Chaplain of the Senate, read the Scriptures, and offered a prayer, after which the Rev. Byron Sunderland proceeded to deliver the funeral sermon.

New York, March 29.—The failure of Culver, Penn & Co. has caused the suspension of several banks in the oil regions, and creates much commotion among oil operators. Culver is a member of Congress from Pennsylvania and a leading land speculator.

Toronto, March 29.—Orders have been issued to muster out the volunteers in excess of 10,000, retaining that number as a standing army of observation against the Fenians.

Washington, March 29th.—A vote on the passage of the Civil Rights Bill over the veto in the Senate will not be reached for several days, and it is hoped meanwhile the vacancies from Vermont and New Jersey will be filled by Republican Senators.

Returns received at the General Land office exhibit nearly 12,000 acres taken up during January at Roseburg, Oregon, for actual settlement.

Since the mail service began to be restored in the Southern States the receipts of the department run largely behind the expenses.

The Secretary of the Treasury has authorized the Collector of New York to admit a cargo of hides arrived from South America via Aspinwall.

The May interest on the 5-20 bonds will be paid early in April, amounting to \$22,000,000 in gold.

Cairo, Ill, March 28.—Mrs. Jeff Davis and her two children arrived here to day on the steamer Luminary, accompanied by Colonel Jenkins. The party go to Louisville en route for Canada.

The Evening Post says the only feature of importance in Government securities is the increasing demand for compound interest notes, in which the banks are investing a large amount of their surplus means. One reason is the fear that Government will cease to pay interest on deposits.

Washington, March 30.—In the Senate, Mr. Sumner moved that a copy of the resolution in reference to the seat of Mr. Stockton be communicated to the Governor of New Jersey, which was adopted.

Santa Clara, April 3.—Wm. Haun, the former owner of Haun's mill at McCartyville, was shot and instantly killed this morning by a man of the name of Caldwell, in a squatter row, in which several persons were engaged, and another person reported wounded. Caldwell has escaped. The row was on a wood ranch near Saratoga Springs.

Yreka, April 3.—Heavy rain has fallen here almost incessantly for the past two weeks. Mountain streams have been and are yet very full. Much damage has been done to bridges and roads.
