How It was Done—In an article entitled "Hon. Wilson Bowlby," the Oregon Statesman explains how the nomination of Mallory was secured at the Union State Convention, at Corvallis, as follows:

HON. WILSON BOWLBY—The proceedings of the Union State Convention show that this gentleman received but twenty four votes for the nomination to Congress. It is a duty which we owe to Dr. Bowlby and his friends, we being one of them, and which impartial justice demands, that this vote of the Convention be explained, and that it be not permitted to go to the world as the measure of his popularity, or the true estimate of that Convention or the Union party of Oregon, of one of the purest, ablest and best men in the State. We were at the Convention, and know whereof we speak.

It was not expected by Dr. Bowlby's friends that he would be nominated on the first ballot; while Mallory's friends were satisfied that unless their man was chosen on the first ballot, he could not be nominated at all. Mr. Baker, of Union county, was brought forward by the delegates east of the mountains, not with any expectation of nominating him, but in order to give him a complimentary vote, and then on the second ballot go in a body for Bowlby. Mr. Mallory was the first choice of about fifty delegates, made up of the vote of Marion county, the vote of Multnomah with one exception, the vote of Linn with two or three exceptions, the vote of Douglas, and part of the vote of Jackson, with some outside scattering votes. Of these votes which would be cast in the first instance for Mallory, about twenty would have pulled away and gone for Bowlby on a second ballot. Thus it was plain to the friends of Mr. Mallory, and also those of Dr. Bowlby, that unless Mallory was chosen on the first ballot, Bowlby would receive a majority of thirty or forty on the second ballot. Upon these circumstances the friends of Dr. Bowlby relied with confidence, and awaited the result without fear, their favorite totally refusing to make any bargain or arrangement that would enlarge his vote on the first ballot.

With Mr. Mallory's known strength his friends had no hope of securing his nomination; but to increase that strength, and, if possible, secure the victory on the first balloting, unsuspecting friends of Dr. Bowlby were approached and asked to cast their first vote for Mallory, as a complimentary vote; that "Mallory had no expectations of a nomination, and therefore, as he is a good man, let us compliment him with a handsome vote." In this way, votes enough were secured to swell Mallory's vote on the first ballot to a majority; and when the ballots were counted out the strategy was visible.

We will not conceal our disappointment and chagrin at the defeat of Dr. Bowlby, accomplished in this way. We labored for his nomination, as the first consideration of the Convention, after the adoption of a platform of sound, vital principles. We have seen the man thoroughly tried, and tempted by all the inside workings of a political convention, and we must say that we have never found a purer, a more upright and thoroughly honorable and noble man in all our experience. He is above all price. Under a plain and unpretending exterior is concealed the jewel of incorruptibility. He is a man that those who know him will fight for against any and all odds. When the Union party of Oregon learn to confide their leadership to such men as Wilson Bowlby of Washington county, they will have learned to honor and respect the noble principles which made the party strong, triumphant and honorable.
