Trevitt and B. L. Norden Secretarieg, The courention had a long and busyveasion during the day, but did not make any nomilations. The following are the resolations adopted a platform :

1. Resolved, That we affirm as the end of our political taith nod prictice, our steadtas devotion to the following principles, viz:
