Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO APRIL 5.

New York, April 3.—The Tribune's special dispatch says all reports about probable passage of the resolution guaranteeing the \$50,000,000 loan, are false, started by an industrious lobby, to give to the bonds a temporary and fictitious value. Not twenty members of the House dare vote for such a measure, as it is well known that the committee on Foreign Relations are nearly unanimous against it.

The Secretary of the Treasury having referred to experiments in chemistry, the question, is petroleum combustible within the meaning of the law? has received a report that it is combustible, and that passenger vessels carrying it require separate license.

Aspinwall's proposed steamship opposition has fallen through definitely. C. K. Garrison bought a controlling interest in the company owning the Star line of steamers, thus defeating their transfer to the new company. Another opposition scheme is maturing. The Nicaragua line is also about to be re-organized and greatly improved by ship-builder Webb.

Chicago, April 4.—At the municipal election yesterday in St. Louis, the conservative candidate for Recorder received 2,000 majority. The City Council is largely conservative. In Cincinnati the Republican ticket got 2,400 majority. The Council stands 27 Republicans and 9 Democrats. In Milwaukee a Democratic Mayor was elected without opposition. At Madison, Maine, a Republican Mayor was elected without opposition. The colored people voted for the first time in Wisconsin. Springfield, Ill., gave 150 Democratic majority. At Leavenworth, Kansas, ex-Governor Kearney, Republican, is elected Mayor, the vote being the largest ever polled. At the Cleveland city election yesterday the Republican ticket elected all their men.

The Iowa Legislature has adjourned, having adopted a proposition to amend the constitution by striking out the word "white" from the suffrage article, which if concurred in by the next Legislature will be submitted to a vote of the people.

Cincinnati, April 4.—M. D. Potter, editor and proprietor of the Commercial died this morning.

New York, April 5.—Advices from the city of Mexico to March 10th, say Gen. O'Gaughey had proclaimed himself President of the Republic by virtue of the constitution of 1857. Gen. Mendez had sustained a severe reverse on the plains of Uruarapan, where, it is stated, 200 prisoners were shot in retaliation for the execution of Liberals by Maximilian. A statement has been published in several parishes to the effect that the Government of the United States had purchased of Denmark the island of Santa Cruz for a naval station, in the West Indies.

Cincinnati, April 4.—Judge Betts discharged the distillers charged with bribing revenue officers, on the ground that the law does not make it a crime.

Trenton, N. J., April 5.—The probability is very strong that there will be no joint meeting of the Legislature, and no Senator elected. A resolution for a joint meeting failed again to-day by the usual vote in the Senate. The Legislature will adjourn sine die to-morrow. The lobby operators have gone home, having given up the contest.

Washington, April 5.—The Mexican Minister has received intelligence from an El Paso communication of important successes by the Liberals, and announcing the expectation that Juarez will establish his seat of Government at Chihuahua.

New York, April 5.—Beatty, Brothers & Co., merchants, have suspended, liabilities \$30,000. The Chronicle says that the failure is attributed to a member of the firm having issued bills amounting to \$25,000 upon a forged document. The delinquent party is reported missing.

Washington, April 5.—The Supreme Court has adjourned, having previously ordered that all cases from the lately rebellious States shall be disposed of at the next term in regular order as they may stand on the docket. The number of cases finally argued but on which there were no decisions and which are therefore continued till next term, is 15. These include the United States vs. Missouri; the test oath case, and that involving the question of the blockade. In addition to these, the docket contains about 250 other cases. The Court at the term just closed announced about eighty decisions.

Chicago, April 5.—At the Rhode Island election yesterday Gen. Burnside was elected Governor almost without opposition, receiving 7,749 votes, against 245 for Lyman Pierce, Democrat.
