COL. COPPINGER's company, of the 14th U. S. Infantry, will soon be ordered from Fort Dalles to Fort Boise.

DR. DUNCAN will deliver the seventh Lecture of the course, at the Congregational Church, this evening.

WE noticed Capt. Borland, of the 1st Oregon Inf., in town last night. His company will arrive from Five Mile creek to-day, where they camped last night, and will soon be mustered out of the service at this place.

HON. J. D. FAY, Democratic nominee for Congress, addressed a large meeting at the Court House last evening on the political issues of the day. Mr. Fay is a good speaker, and promises to make a lively canvass. He was followed by Mr. Barnum, of Union county, who made a brief speech.

MAJOR BLAKE, late of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express and Major Robinson, an experienced assayer, left the Dalles on Saturday last, for the Suswap country. These gentlemen go to superintend the working of a silver lode lately discovered there, and for which the British Columbia Gold and Silver Mining Company was recently organized in Portland.

THE old council held their last meeting yesterday evening, and all the new municipal officers took their oaths of office and qualified. Mayor N. H. Gates, in a few brief remarks, thanked the old council and city officers for the gentlemanly and prompt manner in which they had performed their several duties, and the old council returned a vote of thanks to Col. Gates, when the meeting adjourned.

The new council meets again on next Thursday night at 7 p. m.

FIRE.—On Sunday last, at about 2 o'clock, an alarm of fire was given, occasioned by the burning of a temporary kitchen attached to the residence of Judge Wilson, on the bluff. The whole fire department was out promptly; but owing to the great distance and the advanced stage of the fire before it was known in town, the "boys" did not reach the spot till the fire had nearly exhausted itself by entirely consuming that part of the house in which it originated. Fortunately there was a strong wind which aided the efforts made to save the main building. Judge Wilson saved his house by determinedly standing up to and fighting the fire, and we regret to have to add that in consequence his face is badly burned, so much so, that it is an entire blister.

A WAY TO STOP INDIAN DEPREDATIONS.—We have been shown a letter, addressed to N. H. Gates, of this city, by a gentleman residing on the Canyon City road, in which it is stated that the people of Canyon City, exasperated at the repeated and long continued outrages of the Snake Indians, have raised a fund, and offer a bounty of \$50 for scalps. It is urged that the people of the Dalles ought to take similar action if they wish ever to render this important tributary to their prosperity a road which can be traveled in safety. This is a harsh and barbarous mode of procedure, but if it is the only way which can be devised to remedy the existing evil, the value of white life, and the importance of a civilized respect for the rights of property are not to be weighed against the extermination of a murderous, predatory horde of red skins. The letter further states that fresh outrages are becoming more and more frequent, and that plenty of parties are willing to risk their lives to secure these bounties, and rid the country of these pests.

THE MINING BUREAU.—We find in the *National Intelligencer* the following, which we commend to all persons having it in their power to contribute specimens. A collection of this nature, properly labelled, accessible to everybody who visits our National Capital, will not only be an invaluable and interesting museum of itself, but will be a most substantial exponent of the wealth of our country to the representatives of other nations:

The Secretary of the Interior has prepared a circular, addressed to all the mining companies of the gold and silver mining companies of the West, requesting them to present specimens from their mines of all the various ores. Within two years, it is the opinion of the Secretary, we will thus have at the Patent Office the richest and most varied and instructive cabinet of precious ores that exists anywhere in the world. This measure is introductory to the establishment of a Bureau of Mining and Minerals, which the Western mining interests require.

THE NEWS.—It will be seen by a telegram in to-day's issue, that the U. S. Senate has passed the Civil Rights Bill over the President's veto. A bill has passed both Houses of Congress, granting the right of way to the Cascade Railroad Company over the military reserve, at the Cascades, Washington Territory. It is estimated that under existing orders, nearly, if not all, of the volunteer force of the Government will be mustered out by the 1st of May next. The Victorians are having a little scare over Fenianism.
