Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

DATES TO APRIL 5.

San Francisco, April 7.—The Senate passed the Civil Rights Bill over the President's veto. Ayes, 33; noes, 15

Chicago, April 6.—In the House, on Monday, Mr. Biwell, of California, asked consent to report the bill granting lands to aid the construction of a rail road to connect California and Oregon. The said bill had been before the House for several months, and it was important and should pass, in order that companies might begin work this season. If delayed another month here, the work would be delayed a whole year.

Julian, of Indiana, objected because the bill revolutionized the whole land policy by making direct grants to the company. The House refused to suspend the rules to allow the bill to be reported.

Chicago April 6.—The Canadians are again in great alarm. They have reliable reports that war vessels and convoys, including two schooners loaded with cannon, are fitting out in Chicago. There are also rumors that an expedition under B. Doran Killian, consisting of three steamers, with 5,000 men, has sailed from New York for New Brunswick. Another report gives Bermuda as its destination. It is believed that Sweeney designs an attack on Central Canada.

An official proclamation from Col. O'Mahoney announces the escape of Jas. Stephens from Ireland, his arrival at Paris, and his speedy arrival in the United States to heal the dissensions unfortunately prevailing in the ranks of the brotherhood here.

Charleston, April 5.—An extensive conflagration this morning destroyed the block on King street, known as Polk's Exchange; loss \$100,000 insurance, \$75,000.

New York, April 6.—A fire occurred to-day at the corner of Broadway and Barclay streets in the building known as the Bixbita Hotel, and several buildings on Claremont and Fulton streets were destroyed.

Reports from Wisconsin estimate the damages by freshets at \$2,000,000. Some important railroad bridges were carried away, and it will require several weeks to replace them. Travel is very much impeded.

Washington, April 6.—Alex. H. Stevens had a long conference with the President yesterday.

New York, April 6.—A. H. Markland has been appointed Special Mail Agent for the Pacific coast.

The Times' Washington special dispatch says: The President will in a few days, send a message to Congress asking a modification of the test oath in order to enable the Government to appoint Revenue officers in the South.

For BLACKFOOT.—A party of about thirty persons, with thirty pack animals, started for Blackfoot yesterday, by the overland route to White Bluffs.
