Epitome of Telegraphic News.

San Francisco, April 10.—No eastern news to-day. The Pacific Mail steamship Golden City sailed this morning for Panama with 545 passengers.

Judge Dwinelle has overruled the demurrer to complaint in the breach of promise suit of Caroline T. Clark vs. Michael Reese.

J. W. Buford, a miner and prospector, whose operations have been principally about Oroville, has filed his application in insolvency. His liabilities amount to \$5,375; no assets.

Just before the departure of the Golden City this morning it was discovered that Sewell W. Baker, clerk of the What Cheer House, who was said to have been knocked down on the occasion of the robbery, was trying to escape on the ship and was arrested by detectives Lees and Ellis.

New Westminster, April 9.—From a reliable miner who arrived at Yale last night from Lytton, we learn that rich bank diggings have been struck on Carns' creek, Big Bend. The prospects obtained were so rich as to create excitement. The discoverer of the diggings immediately proceeded to Lytton City, where he recorded 18 claims, and he sold 16 ounces of coarse gold which he had taken out, to Messrs Bruic Bros., merchants. Some prospecting was done in the vicinity of Carns' creek last fall, by a company of Caribooites, of which Bob Nobles was a member. They found the diggings were deep, and that they could not get down to bed rock before the winter set in, and being short of provisions they were obliged to leave until spring. The bank diggings were not known last fall, and their discovery cannot fail to be a valuable addition to the previous discovery made in the Big Bend country.

Lakes Kamloops and Suswap were not open one week since, but it is the opinion of those who have returned from Savannah Ferry, that they will be navigable by this time. A great number of men have already proceeded to the mines from all quarters, and there is but one opinion regarding their richness and extent. During the present week six pack trains with goods, have left Yale for the new mines. Stages are running three times a week with passengers. Great progress has been made in building the Hudson Bay Company's steamer. The machinery will leave Yale to-day. It is anticipated that about the first day of May the Marten will be in running order.

We learn from the resident magistrate of Yale, that he has received a letter from the recording officer at Lytton City, confirming the news of a miner having come there to record eighteen bank claims on Carns' creek, Big Bend, and also that he has a considerable quantity of gold dust in his possession.

IDAHO ITEMS.—To Mr. S. Buchanan, of Wells, Fargo & Co. we are indebted for files of late Idaho papers. We select the following items:

The Harris Mill at the Wide West is grinding out gold at the rate of five hundred dollars a day.

A man named Manuel Ignacio was drowned in the Weiser River, near Boise City, on the 29th of March last. He was one of a number of stage passengers who were crossing in the ferry boat. As the boat neared the shore it sank, and with the exception of this man all the rest succeeded in getting ashore.

At Buena Vista Bar a man named McKay was shot by another named Dunn, under circumstances which induce the belief that it was a premeditated murder. There had been an old grudge between the parties, and at the time of shooting the murdered man was passing, and even attempted to escape. Dunn fled but was captured and committed.

The Ada volunteers have returned after being out twenty-four days without finding any Indians.

The streams were all exceeding high. The Snake was bank full, the Grande Ronde was overflowing, the bridges on the Weiser were all carried away, and Powder River is up all around Baker City.
