Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO APRIL 10.

Chicago, April 11.—At the city election in Springfield, Illinois, yesterday, the vote was the largest ever polled. A Democratic Mayor was elected by 25 majority.

At the Albany, New York, election yesterday, G. H. Thatcher, Democrat, was elected Mayor by 700 majority, over Robert H. Payson.

At the Trenton, New Jersey, election, yesterday, the Democrats had 300 majority.

The municipal election in St. Paul, Minn., yesterday, gave the Democrats 130 majority.

The first suit under the civil rights bill was instituted at Lafayette, Indiana, yesterday, a negro claiming to enforce a contract under it, while the defendant claims the benefit of the State constitution and black laws. Judge West, of the State Circuit Court, has the case under advisement, and will probably send it to the State Supreme Court, now in session.

Dispatches from Eastport, Maine, represent that there is much excitement on the border owing to the presence of a large number of Fenians, and the fears of hostilities. Three British war ships are on the lookout. The garrison at Campbell Island has been increased, earthworks have been thrown up, and vigilant preparations have been made to prevent a raid.

Washington, April 11.—The Senate has confirmed the nominations of David W. Ballard, of Oregon, for Governor of Idaho; R. C. McCormick, for Governor of Arizona; J. P. L. Carter, of Tennessee, for Secretary of Arizona; Moses Hall, Chief Justice of Utah; D. Halloway, Marshal, and Frank Malley, Secretary of Colorado.

Prominent friends of the President say he will enforce the Civil Rights Bill in good faith, quoting the remark that "he having exercised his constitutional prerogative in vetoing the bill, and Congress having exercised its prerogative in passing it, he shall feel bound by their action." These gentlemen also express the belief that having seen the power of Congress and with what unanimity it is sustained by the people, he will now endeavor to conform his action so that there may be harmony between them. Gen. Howard will, under verbal instructions from the President, issue a circular to his subordinates, apprising them of the passage of the Civil Rights bill, and instructing them to inform the freedmen of its provisions and to assist in maintaining them.

The House passed the bill this afternoon for coining new five cent pieces composed of copper and nickel, a trifle larger than three cent pieces issued last year.

New York, April 11.—The Tribune's Washington special dispatch says the Senate yesterday failed to confirm Louis D. Campbell, of Ohio, as Minister to Mexico.

Considerable excitement was caused by the death of a woman last Monday, 9th, of Asiatic cholera. The Sanitary Superintendent of the Board of Health declares the case was not cholera, but the coroner declares it was, and there is much excitement throughout the city.

A MYSTERIOUS CIRCUMSTANCE.—On the morning of the 19th of March, Avery Shelly left the residence of David Taylor, about five miles east of Springfield, Lane county, Oregon, for the purpose of going to the slough to look at a mill site. After going a short distance from the house in company with Mr. Taylor, he remarked that he "was not much on the work to-day, and believed he would go to town," and if "he didn't see Henderson (his brother) at Eugene he would go up on the other side of the river." Mr. Taylor was then requested to walk along with him a short distance, which he did; then returning to his house and Shelly taking the road toward town. From the time he parted from Taylor no traces whatever have been discovered of him up to this date, April 1st. He was married on the 8th of March, and was making arrangements to put in some grain on Monday after he disappeared, had said nothing of leaving for the mines or any other place; nor is there any known cause of his absconding himself voluntarily from his wife and friends. He was 22 years of age, about 5 feet 7 inches in height, light complexion, and rather light built.
