They had a re-union at the Neil House, Columbus, with much jollification before retuning to bidiana. Bowles, released a few days previously, is now stumping Indiana for the Democratic ticket.

Washington, April 12.-President Johnson ordered the suspension of Mayor Mouroe and Alderman Nixon of New Orleans until they are pa doned. Acting Mayor Clark contin es in office.

Gen. Grant was accested last Saturday by a policeman or fast driving. He was tred to-day before a Justice of the Peace and paid the fine. Capt. R. B. Winder, imprisoned at Richmond for several months, was dis-charged to day by order from Washington.

The House spent considerable time upon the bill giving army paymasters during the late war a commiss on of one quarter o one per cent. on all sums disbursed by them, as a compensation for their risks and abors The measure would requi e two and a half millions. It met a very gene al and decided opposition, and probably wil never come again to the urface:

The House passed the bill for reimbursing Massac usett. for her militia expenses; amounting to \$671,668.

Ch cago, April 12.—The Senate, on Mon-day, April 5th, passed an act for the ap-pointment of three Commissioners to codify the laws of the United States, each receiving a sala y of \$5,000 a year, for not exceeding three years.

In the Senate, Stewart, of Nevada, prescated a joint resolution proposing to amend the Constitution by prohibiting distinction on account of color, prohibiting the payment of the rebel debt, and providing that when any one of the eleven second States shall comply with hese conditions, it shall be admitted to representation; referred to

the commit ee of fifteen.

Eulogies of the late Senator Foote were pronounced by V. T. Johnson, of Maryland, Fessenden, of Maine, Sumner, of Massachusetts, Brown, of Missouri, Pomeroy, of Kansas, Uragin, of New Hampshire, Chambers, of Vermont, and McDougal, of California, after which the Senate adjourned
