Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

San Francisco, April 16 .- Front the Alta's proof the following particulars of a terfible calamity are given a At thirteen and a half minutes past one o'clock, P. M. to day, our city was s ar led by a shock like the explosion of some vast mine during a siege, and for many blocks in every direction from the forthwest corner of California and Montgomery streets the air was filled with dust and flying rubbish, and gless came ratting down from every window as if the explosion had occurred in each separate build fig. The consternation which seized on the The consternation which seized on the passers by Wells, Fargo & Co.'s was terrible. Men; women, children, horsemen, pedestri-mis, dray and express teams, without driver-, came charing pell mell down the street in inex ricable confusion. As soon as the first panic began to subside, there was an immeuse rush toward Wells, Fargo & Co.'s buildings, and the strees were for a few seconds so blocked up that it was almost impossible for the fire engines to be brought into position to check the flames, which were thought to break out in the stene of the explosion.

At first it was almost impossible to 'ocate the scene of the explosion, so terrible was the devastation and so general was the ruin in the vicinity, but investigations made within a few minutes demonstrated the fact that it occurred somewhere in the rear of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s buildings, on the northwest corner of Montgomery and California streets, and Be l's Assay office in the rear of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s on Galitornia be ween Montgome y and Kearney stress. Our reporter gained admission through the Union Glub Rooms over W. F. & Co's, and on reaching the rear a scene which utterly beggars de-scription, met the eye. The large, one-story structure containing the office and billiard room of the Union Club, over the arched gateway which leads into the rear of W. F. & Co.'s office, from California street, was an entire wreck, the end being blown out the floor torn into splinters, the iron roof rolled up like a piece of wall paper, the rafters hanging loose in every direction, the furni ture smashed, and billiard tables crushed by the weight of debris. The brick kitchen of the C ub which stood in the rear was gone entirely, only fragments of the timber lying here and there among the debris which filled the area. The rear wall of Bell's brick building, used as ar assay office, and the labor-story in the rear of the assay office, were fall ng in fragments every minute. The roof was hanging down unsupported on the side next the area, and the store house of Wells, Fargo & Co. was lying a mere heap of brick, plaster and broken timbers. Blood was vis-ible in many places, and men with heads or hands cut by falling glass or timbers were running back and forth in frantics arch for missing friends. The main and rear walls of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s building were tertibly shattered, while fragments of doorways and window sashes only remained in places throughout the entire building.

The fine horses attached to the ruins of

Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express wagon, lay in the agonies of death in the area. Everybody seemed stunned by the suddenness of the shock, and no one appeared to know which way to turn or where to begin. Tuere was not a whole window for a long distance from the building in which the explosion took place, an Brannar's Block, opposite to Wells, Farge & Co.'s, on Montgomery street, the Stevenson House, opposite, and mary build-ings between California and Sacramente streets, window-framesand doors were generally 'shattered to fragments, while huge splinters of costly glass covered the streets. The wood-work of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s establishment was almost wholly blown to fragments. Even the doors were thrown outward into the street. Fragments of hu man remains were found scattered in many places-[Here the line feiled.]
