Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO APRIL 18.

Chicago, April 18.—Congress reported a bill to prohibit the absence of Territorial officers last Friday, and adverted in severe language to the conduct of Secretary Meagher who had given new direction to administration and sentiments of the people.

Governor Edzeron's absence seems to be inexcusable. The President has filled his place.

The War Department directs the muster-out of all colored troops, except twenty regiments, which are retained as follows: District of Columbia, 1 regiment; South Carolina, 1; North Carolina, 1; Florida, 1; Alabama, 2; Mississippi, 4; Tennessee, 4; Kentucky, 2; Sherman's military division, 4.

The Adjutant General announces officially that the President's peace proclamation does not withdraw martial law, but adds that it is not expedient to resort to military tribunals in any case where justice may be obtained through the civil authorities.

Portreaux Monroe, April 16.—U. C. Clay was released under the President's order this morning.

Chicago, April 18.—Gen. Meade and staff have gone to E. St. Paul, Me., supposed to look after the Finians.

The House committee on territories have had under consideration for some time an application of the people of Utah, asking admission into the Union. The committee have taken considerable evidence in relation to it, and are of opinion that the condition of affairs in that territory will not permit her admission. There were some rich developments before the committee relative to polygamy.

Petitions from several thousand citizens of Indiana, Pennsylvania and Michigan, were presented to the House, in favor of increasing the duty on foreign wool.

The report of the House Judiciary Committee, containing strong evidence against Jeff. Davis, heretofore in possession of the bureau of military business, will be presented on Friday, the 20th inst.

New York, April 18.—The Lincoln funeral car was purchased by H. C. Durand, who tenders it for the use of the Union Pacific Railroad, for the accommodation of its officers on special occasions. The car leaves in a few days for the west, with several Government directors, who go out to examine the condition of the road. The car was bought by Ward H. Lamton, at a sale of Government stock last week, to prevent its purchase by speculators, and the Secretary of War consents to the final disposition as above.

New York, March 18.—The steamer City of Norwich of the New London line collided on the Sound with a schooner at 4 o'clock this morning. The steamer was set on fire and burned to the water's edge. It is supposed that ten lives were lost.

The car driver's strike has broken out with increased violence. The drivers found they were to be deceived by the arrangement made yesterday.

A fire at Titusville Pa., this morning destroyed a number of blocks in the central part of the city. Loss, over \$30,000.

Halifax, April 18.—A resolution in favor of the confederation of the provinces passed both houses of the Nova Scotia parliament. The New Brunswick parliament has adjourned for a month, to enable the new minority to be formed and elections held to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of members.

Omaha, April 18.—The Government Commissioners have examined and accepted the second section of the Union Pacific Railroad. The track is now being laid at the rate of a mile a day.

New York, April 18.—Thirty ships left Liverpool for this port during the month of March, with 3,648 cabin and 1,084 steerage passengers. Number of passengers for the quarter, 24,277.

Ole Bull, the celebrated violinist, died at Quebec on the 16th inst.

The Times' Washington special correspondence says the Postmaster General is satisfied of the feasibility and practicability of incorporated proposed National Telegraph Companies, to connect lines over all post routes. If the estimates are correct, ordinary messages can be transmitted at the rate of one cent for three words.

St. Louis, April 18.—The Pacific Railroad is completed twenty-two miles west of Topeka.
