

Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO APRIL 23.

New York, April 20.—The steamer Arizona has arrived from Aspinwall. A fearful explosion occurred on the steamer European, at Aspinwall, on the 3d inst., destroying the ship and four hundred feet of the wharf. The supposed cause was nitro-glycerin. About fifty persons were killed, among them the captain and officers.

Fire Marshal Baker, under the instructions of Mayor Hoffman, to-day seized about three hundred pounds of nitro-glycerin stored up in the town; also, a large quantity on board a ship in the harbor, and arrested Col. Otto Burtinbinder for shipping a quantity of the same to California that exploded there. The damage caused by the explosion at Aspinwall is estimated at one million of dollars. The officers of the Panama Railroad Company in this city estimate the loss of that company at one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Chicago, April 20.—The reported death of Ole Bull, which has caused most extensive obituary notices, is now denied, and it is stated he is not in the country.

Washington, April 20.—The rewards for the arrest of Booth are divided as follows: Capt. Dougherty, of the Sixteenth New York Cavalry, \$75,000; Lt. Conger and L. D. Baker, \$1,000 each; Detective Gen. L. C. Baker, \$3,700; Boston Corbit, \$3,000; the privates of the Sixteenth New York Cavalry about \$2,000 each.

San Francisco, April 20, 9:45 p. m.—The coroner's jury found a verdict that Samuel Knight and other victims of the explosion came to their death on Monday last, by the explosion of nitro-glycerine, shipped in a wooden box from New York city to W. H. Mills, Los Angeles, by express. The said box arrived in a leaky condition, and had no marks to indicate the character of its contents. That this nitro-glycerin is a highly dangerous and very explosive compound as appears from the testimony of experts, exploding not only from concussion and percussion, but from spontaneous combustion. That it is an article which should not be shipped by sea vessels, more especially upon such a voyage as that from New York, and that the party that shipped this particular box unmarked was guilty of a crime equal to manslaughter. They urge the indictment and punishment of the shipper, if he can be found. They exonerate the Pacific Mail Steamship Company and Wells, Fargo & Co. from blame in this particular instance, but condemn the practice of express companies and other carriers, in endangering human life by receiving without question, packages, the contents of which they have no knowledge. The same verdicts are returned in each case.

Frank Morris, second clerk of the Union Club, died last night from the effects of the late explosion. This is the twelfth victim known to be dead.

Dates from La Paz, Arizona, up to the 13th inst., were received last evening. Major Miller, of the 14th Infantry, and four men were killed by the Indians between San Pedro and Tucson. Dr. Tappan was dangerously wounded and temporarily left behind somewhere near a place called Picahico. It is said he will not live.

Summary justice was meted out to the man who committed the murder near Fort Yuma. He was taken, tried and hung, all in regular form and without entailing the expense of long detention to the thinly settled country.

Fort Steilacoom, April 11.—Last Sunday night, the 15th inst., a courier arrived at Ft. Steilacoom, about midnight, with an urgent request from Superintendent Waterman for thirty men and two bowitzers to proceed immediately to Cape Flattery, as the Government property and the lives of the employees were in imminent danger from hostile Indians; one murder having already been committed. On Monday morning, the 16th, Commandant Ross started the detachment, which, on arriving at Neah Bay, attacked the Indians, and in a short skirmish captured thirteen of the ugliest rascals ever seen, who just now arrived in charge of Sergeant Walker. Lieut. Kistler, twenty-six men, and two bowitzers are still retained by Agent Webster, of the Neah Bay Reservation.

The steamer Oneonta brought from below yesterday 130 passengers, most of whom are bound for the mines. Those who intend going to Montana, we would advise to purchase their outfits at the Dalles, and take the overland route to White Bluffs. Horses are plenty in the market and are sold at prices no higher than at towns further up the river. The saving of distance is also an item which every man who intends going to Montana will, or ought to look at. Grass, wood and water are plenty along the whole way; and it is in every respect the way to reach the mines.
