Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[CONTINUED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

Washington, April 15.—In the House, Kansas, of the resolution which was adopted, directing the President to communicate any regulations entered into or proposed, in relation to the public debt, known as the cotton loan.

Handell, of Pennsylvania, offered a resolution which was adopted, instructing the committee on commerce to inquire what legislation is necessary to prevent foreign vessels bringing hither passengers in undue proportion to their capacity, whereby cholera is likely to be introduced.

The Speaker presented a statement from the Superintendent of public building, stating that he had caused the escalators of West Virginia and Nevada, to be painted on the glass panels over the hall of the House.

The bill to secure the speedy construction of the Union Pacific Railroad, and thus guarantee its bonds, was taken up and read twice.

Wentworth, of Illinois, Delano, of Ohio, and Spaulding, of Ohio, spoke against the bill, and Woodbridge, of Vermont, in favor of it.

Morrill, of Vermont, from the committee on ways and means, reported a bill to amend the revenue act.

In the Senate, Sherman, of Ohio, from the committee on agriculture, reported a resolution to print 10,000 copies of the report on the subject of the rinderpest. Sherman said the committee had considered the subject of the rinderpest, but had come to no conclusion as to the mode of preventing its spreading in the country. In England, the Parliament had ordered the procurement and slaughter of cattle in all infected districts, but this he did not believe could be done in this country, under our form of government. The Senate then took up the Colorado question.

Doolittle, of Wisconsin, in the course of his speech, defended his position relative to the resolution of the Wisconsin Legislature, asking him to resign.

Howe followed, commenting upon Doolittle's remarks. After further debate, the Senate by 19 against 3, reconsidered the former vote, and then by a vote of 19 against 13, passed the bill admitting Colorado.

In the Tennessee House of Representatives on the 23d inst., the majority report on elections recommending the admission of the bolters to their seats, was rejected by a vote of 42 to 18; and by the same vote, the minority report refusing the bolters seats, was adopted.

Sumner, of Mass., before the final vote, offered an amendment providing that Colorado shall amend her constitution in favor of universal suffrage as a condition precedent to admission. Rejected, yeas 7, noes 27. Those voting in the affirmative were Edmunds of Vermont, Foster of Connecticut, Grimes of Iowa, Howe of Wisconsin, Morgan of New York, Poland of Vermont, and Sumner of Massachusetts.

Washington, April 25.—There is a rumor current at the Capitol that the Reconstruction committee at its meeting to-day, failed to agree on a report, there being some disagreement among the leaders. An effort will, however, be made to reconcile the conflicting views.

New York, April 26.—The Deputy Health Officer reports twelve individual deaths from cholera on the hospital ship, and the reception of five new cases.

Official statistics were published by Otto Bartenbender to-day, charged with the shipment of nitro-glycerine by Wells, Fargo & Co.'s California Express. Alfred Noble, the inventor, was called for the defense and defined the properties of the oil as follows: 1st, it is a liquid; 2d, it is poisonous; 3d, if set on fire, it does not explode; 4th, if confined and heated to 300 degrees it explodes; 5th, it has more concentration of power than gunpowder. He said: "We are trying the experiment of mixing it with sawdust. My belief is that the mixture will prove more dangerous than the oil itself. Nitro-glycerine is not inflammable, for if fire is set to it, it does not catch like turpentine or spirits, but goes out when the match is withdrawn. It does not explode by the application of fire. Its use through blasting is only possible through a patent fuse, as a shower of sparks will not explode it. The application of fire has been tried hundreds of times. Concussion will not explode it. We tried throwing it from heights of fifty feet, and in Hamburg the experiment was tried of tying it to a rocket, and its fall of more than one thousand feet did not explode it. We afterwards proved it by heat in confined space, showing it to be pure."

New York, April 22.—The steamer City of Boston, from Liverpool, April 11, via Queens-town, April 12, has arrived.

London, April 13.—Consols closed at 89 1/2 @ 89 1/2 for money; 5-20's 71 1/2 @ 71 1/2.

The Austria-Prussia difficulty continues. It is asserted that Prussia decidedly refused to comply with the Austrian request to withdraw the order for the mobilization of the army.
