Epitome of Telegraphic News.

Boston, April 26.—The Journal's Eastern, Maine, correspondent says: A schooner arrived from Portland, with arms for the Fenians, and the United States Collector had instructions from Washington to seize them if there appeared to be any danger of the Fenians using them during the following night, eight cases were surreptitiously removed from the schooner, whereupon the Collector seized the balance, numbering 123 cases—in all, 1,500 rifles of the Springfield or Enfield pattern, second hand, and removed them to Fort Sullivan for safe keeping. Gen Meade arrived next day and approved the proceedings, and since then all has been quiet on the Passamaquoddy.

New York, April 26.—The Deputy Health Officer's report shows that there has been 32 new cases admitted to the hospital ship, and two deaths since last report. A communication from Dr. Swinburn, Health Officer, to the Board of Health, states that matters are progressing favorably, and that the disease is assuming a milder type. The increased number of the admissions to the hospital ship was occasioned by sudden changes of temperature.

Chicago, April 26.—The bill to amend the internal revenue law, reported to the House yesterday, reduces taxation to the extent of \$41,000,000 per annum, and provides for the following taxes: Five cents per pound on cotton, with drawback on cotton goods exported; five per cent. tax on incomes in excess of \$1,000. There is no change in the tax on distilled spirits. The tax on crude petroleum is taken off, but kerosine oil is taxed ten cents per gallon. Apothecaries, confectioners, and keepers of eating houses, hotel or taverns, pay no tax. The only change in the tobacco tax is a reduction of tax on smoking tobacco from 35 to 25 cents per pound. Schedule "A" is stricken out except as to billiard tables and carriages valued above \$300. The tax on Express Companies is increased from 5 to 6 per cent. on the gross receipts. Sales made by brokers, whether made for the benefit of others or on their own account, shall pay a tax at the rate of 5 per cent. for every one hundred dollars, on contracts for stocks, bonds, foreign gold silver bullion; coin, uncurrent money, etc., twenty cents on every \$100 of amount of such sales of securities. Saving banks are exempt from taxation on deposits invested in U. S. securities, and such other deposits less than three hundred dollars, as are made in the name of any person. The stamp duties on weights and measure returns are abolished. Nearly every kind of agricultural implements, photographs, engravings sold less than ten cents, or used for books and photographs so small that stamps cannot be fixed thereto, are exempt.

Chicago, April 26.—M. A. Albert, being prevented by the infirmities of age from visiting Chicago, as ambassador from the French people to Mrs. Lincoln, for the purpose of transmitting the gold medal in commemoration of President Lincoln, it has been decided to forward the same to the Secretary of State through the American Minister at Paris.

Washington, April 26.—In the Senate, Sumner, of Massachusetts, presented a petition for the expulsion of Garrett Davis, of Kentucky, for having said in debate that should the Civil Rights Bill become a law, he should be compelled to regard himself as an enemy of the Government. Davis said the language attributed to him was correct, but it ought to have been taken with the context. Otherwise it was a garbled statement. The petition was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

New York, April 26.—The Commercial's special dispatch says there is not much chance for the passage of the Northern Pacific Railroad Bill.

Chicago, April 27.—The President yesterday transmitted to Congress a communication from the Secretary of the Interior, in relation to the Central Pacific Railroad Company, Eastern Division. The Company were required to complete 100 miles within three years after their acceptance of the conditions of the original act. This provision expired December 23, 1865. Only 62 miles had been completed, and the commissioners appointed for the purpose have examined and reported upon it, and an application has been made as to its acceptance. The failure to complete 100 miles within the period prescribed, rendered it questionable whether the executive officers of the government are authorized to issue the bonds and patents to which the Company would be entitled if this and other requirements of the act had been observed. This failure may to some extent be ascribed to the financial condition of the country incident to the recent civil war, as the company appear to be engaged in the energetic prosecution of the work, and manifest a disposition to comply with the conditions of the grant. The President recommends that the time for completing that part of the road be extended, and that authority be given for the issue of bonds and patents on account of this section, now offered for acceptance, notwithstanding the failure, should the company in other respects be thereunto entitled.
