A letter dated March 25th, from Mr. John Whittick, of Pipestone District, states that the depth of snow has prevented any great amount of prospecting for some time past, but that some men are looking about the south side of the hills, now. Messrs. Adams, Me Kinstry & Co's mill will be in opera-tion early next week. Shafts forty foot in depth have been sunk on the "Juanita," "Liberty,"" Emigrant" and "Philadelphia," which prospect well.

A letter from Deer Lodge, dated March 25th, contains the following matters of interest to the community : " There is but little news here of inteerest. The weather is fine, and the snow nearly gone of this valley At Blacktoot the snow is still deer, and very little ground in sight. Snow, shoes are still in use; and I do not think that teams will be able to reach (春山) Ophir, Washington, Jefferson or Mc-Ciellan Gulches before May The peo-ple of Biscktoot are in high spirits. They have good mining ground, and plenty of it Business men are repair. ing their places handsomely, and prop. erty of all kinds is looking up, except goods. 

A correspondent writing from Bannack city, says :

The creek claims are yet unworked, but have been prospected for six or eight miles, and are known to be rich. Capital and combination are required here, and no individual miner can work his claim on account of the amount of water, which necessitates a system of drainage.

Descending a short distance on the other side, the Blue Wing District is reached. Here a perfect net work of ilver quartz veins, among which the Huron, Blue Wing, Arizona, Wide West and Silver Rose stand preeminont; simply because shafts have been on them, and their richness has been proved up, and thoroughly tested.


