Epitaphic Telegraphic News. FROM THE OREGONIAN.] TO APRIL 26.

Detroit, April 25.—The steamer Windsor was unloading at the Detroit and Milwaukee docks at 10 o'clock this evening, a barrel of dynamite exploded on board, setting both the steamer and depot on fire. Some forty persons were on board the boat, ten of whom are known to be drowned. The steamer floated down the stream and was totally consumed. The fire destroyed both the passenger and freight depots, a loaded train and all the offices of the Company. The loss is estimated at half a million dollars. It is feared many lives have been lost.

Nashville, April 26.—C. V. Johnson made an elaborate speech to-day, arguing his right to be admitted to a seat in the State Senate, his participation in the rebellion to the contrary notwithstanding; after which the Senate adopted a resolution by yeas 12, nays 7, excluding him on account of treason.

New York, April 27.—The Times' special dispatch says the meeting of the New York Congressional delegation, held on Wednesday evening, 25th, to consider the question of reconstruction, has been the subject of much comment and has created considerable surprise among the extreme men who counted on a majority of that delegation for universal suffrage.

The substance of a plan which, though not formally adopted, was received with the greatest favor by the meeting, is as follows: First, a constitutional amendment basing representation upon population, and providing that where any state denies suffrage to any class of citizens except participating in the rebellion, such disfranchised class shall be excluded from the basis of representation. Second, the constitutional amendment prohibiting the payment of rebellion debt or compensation for services. Third, that whenever these amendments shall be fully ratified and incorporated in the Federal Constitution each of the lately rebellious States shall be entitled to the admission of its representatives on their taking the oath prescribed. Fourth, the following classes to be forever debarred from holding office, namely: the President, Vice-President, Cabinet, Senators, Members of Congress, Judges, foreign agents, etc., of the Confederacy, all persons who left positions under the United States to join the rebellion, all officers of the army above the rank of colonel, and officers of the navy above the rank of masters, and all persons guilty of treating prisoners of war inhumanly. The above plan will be submitted to the Reconstruction Committee. The question of negro suffrage immediate or remote was received with very little favor.

Washington, April 27.—The District of Columbia suffrage bill will be taken up in the Senate next week. It is being asserted that if the Colorado bill passes the House, the President will veto it.

Among the nominations made to the Senate yesterday, were D. L. Gregg, receiver of public money at Carson City, Nevada, John A. Clark, Surveyor General of Nevada, and the following receivers of land offices, viz: Royal Buck, Nebraska City; Chas. K. Dorsey, Brownsville, Nebraska; and Wm. T. Sweeney, Omaha.

New York, April 27.—At the board of Aldermen yesterday a resolution was adopted instructing the committee to report the most expeditious method of removing the Washington market. The board of health will occupy battery barracks immediately. There have been three deaths from cholera, but no more new cases since the last report.

The Fenian war has been resumed in this city by the returning veterans, who bandy epithets more freely than ever, and charge each other with the failure of it. It having been an O'Mahoney expedition, there is a new bolt from the old headquarters, and the Roberts faction enjoy the fresh trouble of Union square. Gillian keeps quiet so far, but his Lieutenant, in command, is very bitter on O'Mahoney, and tell Fenians to stop sending money to the imbecile chief. It appears that when the Fenians were en route for home, some of the belligerent ones draw pistols and ordered the captain to return to the seat of war. They were put ashore on an island on the coast of Maine.

Washington, April 27.—In the House, Mr. Kasson, of Iowa, offered a resolution which was adopted, requesting the President to cause to be furnished to the House a collection of the provisions relating to freedmen Constitutions and laws of the Southern States. The House then resumed the consideration of the Northern Pacific Railroad Bill.

Washington, April 27th.—There seems to be no doubt here that Mrs. Jefferson Davis is now en route hither from Montreal. She has obtained permission from the authorities to visit her husband in Fortress Monroe.
