The Hon Henry A. Wise delivered an address a few evenings ago, before the Richmond Blues, a military company which has been reorganized in that city. The following sketch of a portion of his address is from the Richmond Republic:

"He said he had surrendered in good faith and was a paroled prisoner of war; but that, being above the rank of colonel, he could not apply for pardon without taking a test oath, and that he could not do. He advised the young men who heard him to let their surrender be likewise in good faith. Their duty was to endeavor to reinstate our beloved commonwealth in her former grandeur and glory. Talk not of leaving her; she is still the most delightful and dearest portion of all earth. He warned them not to encourage any thought of establishing a separate government. If they fought again they must fight under the 'stars' and 'stripes.' It was his flag; it was their flag. He said when more than four thousand miles from home that flag was the sheltering aegis that protected him. It was still the symbol of liberty to the oppressed of the whole world, for it was only this country that afforded an asylum from despotism.

"He had heard some young men talk flippantly about the foreign war, such as might result between the United States and France, in regard to Mexico, in which event, they said, they would take sides with the enemy. Let such spurn such an idea from their thoughts, as unworthy of American citizens. Neither did he unite with those who whispered the hope that they would live to see the day when the country would be precipitated into another revolution. It is idle; the man who talks of farther resistance is a fool.

"As for myself, I pray to God to spare the country another war—especially a civil war. Boys, take back the old flag of your forefathers. You have looked upon its folds, floating from the battlements of the enemy's works, until you have come to hate it. Take it back; it's your only flag now. I never hated the old flag; I never fought against it. I loved it when young like yourselves; I love it now, and I will yield to no man living in the earnestness and sincerity of his love for the old starry flag. You, my young friends, can make we old men happy before we go, (turning to Messrs. Tompkins and Bigger.) Go to work; perfect your organization; be good, loyal and useful citizens, and labor for the prosperity of your State, and her restoration to her ancient glory and renown. He urged all his hearers to go to work, not be idle, not to loaf about the streets. He said that he would issue his last order to them as their General. It was that none of them should be drones. If they could not get the work to do that they had been accustomed to, then do whatever come to hand. Do something. If they could not get money for their work, then work for their victuals and clothes. If they could not get their clothes, then work for their food, if they could not get meat, then work for their bread. It was the duty of every man to do something for himself, his family and his country.

The Sentinel says that Mr. Crandall, of Waldo, had his safe robbed of twelve hundred dollars. He was not in the habit of opening his safe every day, and is not certain as to the exact day of the theft. He found his safe locked, but the money gone. Mr. W. Evans, of Althorse, had his store broken open in his absence, his safe taken out, broken open with a sledge hammer, and about two hundred dollars taken out. He had only a few days before taken the remainder of his money to Kerbyville, or it probably would all have been gone. As yet, no traces of the burglars can be discovered.

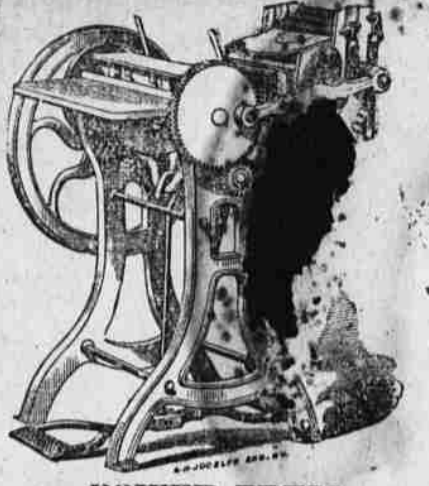
