### IDAHO NEWS.

We take the following items from the *Owyhee Avalanche*, of the 21st ult.:

The California Steam Navigation Company and the Pacific Railroad Company are carrying Idaho freight free of charge to the present terminus of the railroad. The Teamsters' Association have taken freight at 14 cents per pound for carriage to this country. Merchants, millmen, every body, think of it! Freight from San Francisco to Owyhee at 14 cents per pound, and taken at these rates in March. The shipping receipts have already come to hand and there is no mistake about this business. Men and companies representing millions of capital have taken hold of this matter. Orders for goods to come by this route will be promptly forwarded.—Reliable assurance is given that within a few months freight will be dispatched here at seven cents. Ship via Sacramento and get your goods cheaply, quickly and safely freighted.—Things are encouraging. Wouldn't it be well for the O. S. N. Co. to build another steambot on Snake River for the Owyhee trade? The public will take notice that shipping receipts sent here from Umatilla show that 20 cents are the rates by slow freight.

The Ainsworth Mill, on Sinker, is in rather a dilapidated condition. Mr. Leonard, Superintendent, is expected to return soon to overhaul and thoroughly repair the batteries, pans and propelling power. Its location at the junction of two main branches of the Sinker, insures water power for ten stamps at least one-half the year. We understand that a new double turbine wheel is to replace the old arrangement, and the steam works will be fitted up also. The Company are vigorously prosecuting work on the Surplus ground of the Oro Fino, and have already considerable pay rock out at the mine, and to facilitate the work, have erected a whim for raising water and rock. All things considered, the Sinker mills have a scene of prosperity not far ahead.

A large number are preparing for extended prospecting for many miles round, making Owyhee headquarters. Discoveries are daily reported. The present summer will doubtless be one of continual discoveries. We are told that wonderfully rich discoveries are kept secret and neither claimed nor worked for fear of lawsuits—the bane of rich mines. No camp escapes these drawbacks, but Owyhee is bound to grow right up to importance despite them.

The people would welcome almost any change in the currency—if but for the sake of variety. Merchants and mechanics generally refuse nearly every species offered. Laboring men cannot procure articles of grub and clothes without having their currency blowed and culled. We are informed that a number of companies will soon establish the rule of paying in greenbacks. Gold coin or clean dust is lovely and our favorite circulating medium, but just now greenbacks would be a great financial relief.

**THE ADRIATIC**—The ledge bearing this name lies across at the mouth of Coffee Gulch—one mile west of Silver. Upon an examination, last week, we found a tunnel in the 1st Extension south, and a shaft down twenty feet. In the tunnel the ledge was a mere seam, and at the bottom of the shaft fully six feet wide and increasing very fast. Assays of the rock range from \$28 to \$900 per ton.

A. G. Turner is reported as having resigned his share in the Indian Agency business. Arch., after witnessing the Bruneau "treaty" was so thoroughly disgusted as to "throw up the sponge." Sensible.

Weather for the past week has been variable. A mixture of equal parts of rain, snow and sunshine. A slight freeze one or two nights, but snow leaving faster than coming.
