Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO APRIL 20.

Washington, April 28.—The President has pardoned John T. Moore, mayor elect of New Orleans.

The presence of nearly all the Senators and Representatives who support the President, at the White House last evening excites remark.

There seems to be a misapprehension about the tax bill and it is now stated as against the reduction on certain articles. The changes on rates of others will increase the aggregate product of internal revenue nearly \$60,000,000. It is estimated that the cotton tax alone will reach \$3,200,000 additional.

New York, April 28.—The Herald's special dispatch says it is asserted on good authority that the Spanish Minister has proposed to accept the mediation of the United States in the Spanish difficulty with Chile.

Chicago, April 28.—The New York shipping list of the 26th, says that business continues impartially dull, and there is a general depression. Money is so very plenty as to be almost a drug in the market; interest is low.

Dry goods are dull. The Providence printing cloth market is very dull, printers generally as well as speculators declining to buy at present quotations, and anticipate a further decided change. The stocks on hand are accumulating, and will be rapidly declining after the first of May.

Since the last report by the health officer, there have been fifteen new cases of cholera admitted to the hospital—five deaths, leaving ninety-six cases still in the hospital. The sloops of war Saratoga and Portsmouth have been sent to the lower quarantine as hospital ships. Dispatches from Halifax say the passengers by the England left there are now well, and that there has not been any deaths among them during the week.

Chicago, April 29.—The Reconstruction Committee had a few hours' session yesterday, at which all the members were present and agreed upon the following joint resolution, which will be reported to Congress tomorrow as an amendment to the Constitution—namely:

Section 1. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty or property without due process of law; nor deny any person within its jurisdiction equal protection of law.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within the Union according to their respective numbers counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed; but wherever the elective franchise shall be denied to any portion of its male citizens, not younger than twenty-one years of age, or in any way abridged, except for participation in the rebellion or other crimes, the basis of representation of such State shall be reduced in the proportion in which the number of such male citizens not entitled to the franchise shall bear to the whole number of male citizens not less than twenty-one years of age.

Sec. 3. On and up to the 4th of July, 1870, all persons who voluntarily adhered to the late insurrection giving aid and comfort, shall be excluded from the right to vote for members of Congress and for electors for President and Vice President of the United States.

Sec. 4. Neither the United States nor any State will assume or pay any debt or obligation already incurred, nor which may hereafter be incurred, in aid of the insurrection against the United States, or claim compensation for the loss of involuntary servitude.

Congress shall have power to enforce the above legislation, the provisions of which shall be subject to the bill accompanying the above propositions, one of which was the proposition of Senators and Representatives to the late rebellious States, and the above amendment is subject to the Federal Constitution!

The leading rebels from the State or Federal, including heads of departments, judges, governors, officers of the rank of Colonel, and above the rank of Major; and Federal officers in 1862, cabinet, judiciary, or military, who subsequently gave aid and comfort to the rebellion.

The propositions were adopted by a vote of 12 against 3, and the bill was passed by a vote of 12 against 3.

The question requiring negro-suffrage after the war, was not presented in the committee, even though Stevens consenting to drop it. The committee then voted to remove the ban of agency, and considerable satisfaction was expressed that the committee had come to a final conclusion.
