A BENEVOLENT society at Birmingham, England, has forwarded to Gen. Howard, since the termination of the rebellion, articles valued at \$100,000, all of which are for the Freedmen.

THE river at this point is now receding. During the few warm days of last week it threatened to reach its summer height, but the sudden change has caused it to recede. The danger of high water the coming summer, we think, is past. It would be better had the weather continued warm, so that the greater part of the snow would have melted before the regular June rise took place.

PERSONAL.—Hon. David Logan arrived from below last evening, en route for the upper country. We are pleased to announce that he has consented to address the citizens of the Dalles this evening at 7 1/2 o'clock, at Chapin's Hall. Mr. Logan as a speaker, has not an equal in the State; and his efforts in behalf of the Union cause ever since the organization of the party has had a vast influence on our people. Let everybody turn out this evening to hear him.

WE are having all kinds of weather at the Dalles this week. Monday and Tuesday were pleasant sun shiny days, while Wednesday and Thursday have been so cold that a stove feels rather comfortable. Truly this is strange weather for this season. From a gentleman who arrived from below last evening we learn that the farmers in the Willamette have been unable to put in all their crops, owing to the cold, constant rains which have prevailed this spring. The crops will be all later than usual in the Valley this summer.

THE UNION COUNTY CONVENTION.—

The Union County Convention will meet at the Court House to-morrow for the purpose of making nominations to fill the various county offices. The success of the Union party in this county will greatly depend upon the men put forth by the convention. Let the delegates look to this matter, and see that good men are put in the field; men who are not objectionable to the voters on account of any previous transaction in which they may have committed themselves. Particularly do we desire to see men nominated for the Legislature who are identified with our interests, and can legislate intelligibly upon matters of importance to our County. At the coming session of the Legislature there will be legislation required that deeply effect our interests, and it is for this purpose that we desire to see men go there who thoroughly understand the importance of the legislation needed by this County.

FROM CANYON CITY.—We learn from Canyon City that high water in the creek has done great damage to that town. From Woods' stable, at the upper end of town, to Baker's store, is entirely washed away. Several merchants have been compelled to remove their goods to the back part of town, owing to the rapid rising of the water. It is the intention of the people of Canyon City to remove all the stores from the creek, and establish them above high water mark. The miners' claims are all filled up, and it is thought that it will be at least two months before they can get fairly to work again on the creek.

THE City Marshal is doing a good work in the way of having the yards and public alleys cleared up before the warm weather sets in. The rear of the Chinese dens on Second street needs the attention of Marshal Keeler. These pests of society should be compelled to clean up their yards or give the City Recorder a chance to chalk them up to the tune of several greenbacks. We think that if there is anything that would prevent the cholera from visiting a community it would be to drive these semi-barbarians outside its limits. Let the work go on.

THINK OF IT.—We are living in strange times. Red handed murder not only stalks abroad in our midst, but he has grown popular. He is defended by the press and applauded in the Tabernacle. He is toasted at the convivial board, and blessed at the family altar. Men follow him admiringly as sycophants follow their leader; he is "lionized," he is "exalted," he is elevated to the dignity of a "counselor." He subsidizes the daily papers, and their praise of him is only equalled by their denunciations of his enemies. O but he is a "brave" and "honorable" deity! He steals unawares upon his victims, while his admiring toadies stand at the corners ready to succor him from the rude gaze of the rabble. Honest men—Mormons, Jews and Gentiles, applaud his noble work. Only thieves, gamblers, whore-mongers—the dirty and the vile, condemn him in the least!
