Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

Chicago, April 30.—About three o'clock yesterday morning six burdens entered the residence of Cashier Harrison, of the National Bank, at Cadiz, Ohio, bound and gagged the cashier, and compelled him and his wife to deliver up the keys of the bank safe. Proceeding thence to the bank they effected an entrance and robbed the bank of \$300,000 in U. S. bonds, and \$5,000 in deposits.— After locking the watchman inside, they made good their escape on a hand car, after cutting the telegraph wires.

Washington, April 30.—The State Department yesterday received positive advices to the effect that the difficulty between Prussia and Austria will find a peaceable solution. The report comes from the highest authority in the French capital.

Senator Morrill's bill dissolving the present municipal government of Washington, and substituting a board of commissioners, will probably be reported in the Senate this week. A significant feature of the bill is, that the power to appoint commissioners is vested in the Supreme Court of the District. Four members of that body, it is understood, oppose the President's policy.

Washington, April 30.—There has been a careful canvass to ascertain the feelings of Congressmen relative to the report of the reconstruction committee, and it may be stated that although there is some disappointment manifested, the Republican members, with hardly any exception, are willing to accept the propositions of the committee, which are submitted as amendments to the Constitution. Sumner is disposed to support them, though he objects to the terms of the act for the admission of the States. It is understood that Bingham, believing the act as reported will put in the power of a few States to prevent the restoration of others, urged upon the committee the following as a substitute:

Whenever any State lately in insurrection shall adopt these amendments and conform its constitution and laws thereto, it shall be entitled at once to Senators and Representatives in Congress, provided they shall be duly elected and qualified, and can take the oath. It may be considered certain that in addition to the above, various other amendments will be offered in both houses, when the question comes up for discussion. The report was introduced in Congress to-day; it is intended to press it to an early vote, though a reasonable amount of debate will be allowed. Should it be passed by the requisite two-thirds, a resolution will be presented requesting Governors to convene the State legislatures in extra session for the purpose of ratifying the amendment. A Democratic member of the committee, yesterday, submitted the plan as agreed on to the President. Johnson thought it was a practical denial of the negro-suffrage issue, while on the other hand it virtually assumed the unconstitutionality of the civil rights bill by incorporating it in the Constitution.

WHERE IS THE PROTECTION?—It is hoastingly asserted that no more quiet city can be found anywhere than this one. Does the record of last Monday night sustain the assertion? A quiet, peaceable citizen, respected by all who knew him, is foully assassinated. He is shot in the back by a sneaking coward—killed at a time when he is on trial before the Probate Court of this county—obeying to the letter every requirement of that Court. A simple drunk is promptly arrested, imprisoned, fined and taught the majesty of law and municipal regulation; but an assassin can steal up behind a man, discharge a load of buckshot into his body—run across the street in presence of numerous citizens and policemen, and escape. Is that the way to afford peace and security to the residents of this city? It is expected that no efforts will be spared to secure the assassin of Brassfield—notwithstanding it has been asserted in this city that he was justly killed. It is due to the honor and credit of this community that the assassin be punished, and we agree with the Judge of the Probate Court, that it will be very strange indeed if he is not caught and brought to justice. Let the law be administered alike to Mormon and Gentile.— The present will not admit of any distinction. Let it be so remembered.— Vedette.
