

UNION COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Wasco County Convention met at the Court House yesterday pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by Hon. J. G. Wilson, President. A committee of five was appointed on resolutions, who reported the following, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we do hereby affirm and heartily endorse the resolutions adopted by the Union State Convention.

Resolved, That we condemn the total disregard of the interests of the people of this and the adjoining county of Grant, by the authorities of this Military Division, in neglecting to furnish protection to the great thoroughfare from Dalles City, Oregon, to Owyhee, Idaho Territory.

Resolved, That we hereby request our delegation in Congress to use their influence with the War Department, and the Lieut.-General commanding the armies of the United States to furnish the necessary protection needed by our people for the safety of their lives and property—much property and many valuable lives having been sacrificed during the past three years.

Resolved, That we hereby instruct our representative in the legislative assembly of Oregon to insist upon a law lessening the expenses of our County Hospital by providing for State assistance.

The Convention then proceeded to the nomination of candidates for the Legislature.

C. B. Kæle and H. A. Hozue having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared the nominees of the Convention.

The following persons were nominated for county officers:

MIXING MATTERS.

The Civil Rights Bill provides that no change shall be made in relation to the privilege of suffrage. That is to say, that bill does not pretend to alter the suffrage laws existing in the various States. In relation to this matter a very interesting point has recently been sprung. The Civil Rights Bill declares that all persons born in the United States (children of Foreign Ministers, Consuls, etc., alone excepted) are citizens of the United States. The Constitution of the United States provides that "citizens" (no distinction of color made) can be Presidents, Vice Presidents, Senators, Representatives in Congress, etc. According to the Bill of Rights, negroes, Chinese, etc., born in this country are citizens of the United States, and therefore are eligible to the Presidency, seats in Congress, or any other United States office; but according to the suffrage laws of the various States this class of people are prohibited from voting in all the States of the Union except five or six.—The Constitution of the United States does not confer the privilege of suffrage upon any class; neither does it deprive any class of that privilege. The privilege of suffrage has hitherto been regulated solely by the States. Under the new order of things a singular anomaly is presented. In California, as in most of the other States, none but "white citizens" can vote, yet any native-born negro residing in this State is eligible to a seat in Congress, or to any United States office. That is to say, negroes may be United States Marshals, Judges or Collectors in this State, but they cannot vote here! Is there not a conflict or discrepancy here? Is it not rather singular that a person is eligible to the highest office in the land, and yet is not entitled to vote for any office? Those who think that the Civil Rights bill is simply a measure for protecting the negroes of the South, are greatly mistaken. If that bill is carried out, its logical result will be to place every native born negro and Chinaman upon a perfect footing of equality with white men, for no such anomaly in government can exist as that a person can be eligible to the highest offices, and still not entitled to a vote. And not only this, under the Civil Rights bill Chinese may become naturalized citizens of the United States, and when such, will be eligible to United States offices after they have been naturalized a few years. This will be the inevitable result of the Civil Rights bill, as those who are now rejoicing over it will soon find out, when they calmly consider upon the legal effects of that measure. State laws and constitutions must give way to the Civil Rights bill, or the latter must give way to the former. If the former do not give way, then one of the main objects of the bill, the protection of the Southern negroes, will not be gained. If State laws and constitutions give way in one particular, they must in all, and so universal and unrestricted suffrage will soon be accomplished, and then will hasten the downfall of the Republic. Too much voting and too many voters were mainly the cause of our great national troubles. What, then, will be the result of adding over a million of ignorant, semi-barbarous people to our voting population?—S. P. Call.
