Resoured, That we be eay instruct our representative in the legislative assembly of O'eg in to insist upon a law lessening the expenses of our County Hospital by providing for State assistance.

MIXING MATTERS. The Civil Rights Bill provides that no change shall be made in relation to the privdoes not pretend to alter the suffrage laws existing in the various States. In relation existing in the various States. In relation to this matter a ve y interesting point has recently been sprung. The Civil Rights Bill de lares that all persons born in the United States (ch biren of Foreign Ministers, Consuls, etc., alone excepted) are citizens of the United States. The Constitution of the United States povides that "citizens," (no distinction of color made) can be Presidents, Vice Presidents, Senators, Representative in Congress, etc. According to the Bill of Right, negroes. Chinese, etc., born in this country are citizens of the United States, and therefore are eligible to the Presidency, so to in Congress, or any other Presidency, se ts in Congress, or any other United States office; but according to the suffrage laws of the various States this class of people are prohibited from voting in all the States of the Union except five or six .-The Constitution of the United States does not confer the privilege of suffrage upon any class; neither does it deprive any class of that privilege. The privilege of suffrage has hitherto been regulated solely by the States. Under the new order of things a singular anomaly is presented. In California, as in most of the other States, none but " white citizens" can vote, yet any native born ne-gro residing in this State is eligible to a seat in Congress, or to any United States office. That is to say, negroes may be United States Marshals, Judges or Collectors in this State, but they cannot vote here! Is there not a conflict or discrepancy here? It it not rather singular that a person is eligible to the highest office in the land, and jet is not entitled to vote for any office? Those who think that the Civil Rigars bill is simply a measure for protecting the negroes of the South, are greatly mistaken. If that bill is carried out, its logical results will be to place every native born neg o and Chinaman upon a perfect too ing of equality with white men, for no such anamoly in government can exist as that a person can be eligible to the high-est offices, and still not entitled to a vote. And not only this, under the Civil Rights bill Cainese may become naturalized civizens of the United States, and when such, will be eligible to United States offices after they have been naturalized a few years. This will be the inevitable result of the Civil Rights bill, as those who are now rejoicing over it will soon find out, when they calluly consider upon the legal effects of that measure. State laws and constitutions must give way to the Civil Rights bill, or the latter must give way to the former If the former do not give way, then one of the main objects of the bill, the protection of the Southern negroes, will not be gained. If State isws and constitutions give way in one particular, they must in all, and so universal and unrestricted suffrage will soon be accomplished, and then will hasten the downfall of the Republic. Too much voting and too many voters were mainly the cause of our great national troubles. What, then, will be the result of adding over a million of ignorant, semi-barbarous people to say voting population?—S. P. Call.
