Epitome of Telegraphic News.

[COMPILED FROM THE OREGONIAN.]

San Francisco, May 7.—The eastern line is still down beyond Salt Lake; no eastern news received to day. E. A. Swain, one of the Salvador pirates, has been pardoned by President Johnson. He was released from the Penitentiary on Saturday.

New Westminster, May 7.—Latest news from Big Bend mines is to the 1st inst. New diggings have been struck on Clements Creek. Nine dollars to the pan have been taken out. The snow is too soft on the mountains yet for packing with animals, and Indians had to be got to pack freight at 60 cents per pound. Great reduction in prices of provisions at the head of the lake in consequence, and large amounts are arriving which it is impossible to get packed into the mines. Flour at Seymour, is worth 16 cents, in the mines, 40c. Building is going on busily at Seymour. Fourteen boats arrived up the Columbia river in one day, with men and provisions. Hundreds of boats are reported on the way up the Columbia river with men and provisions.

The steamer *Forty Nine* had arrived at the head of Arrow Lake on the 15th ult., with 250 miners. The passengers landed and the boat returned for more miners.

Claim "Slate," on Clemens Creek, is said to be worth \$10,000.

There are rumors that the United States soldiers at Fort Colville had deserted and gone to the mines, taking their arms with them.

Since the above, forty more boats have arrived at the mines. Two new gold bearing creeks, tributaries of French Creek, have been discovered. The greatest confidence in these mines is now felt here.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

The Wasco County Democratic Convention met at the Court House on Monday, May 7th, pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by Col. N. H. Gates, President. After the admission of proxy members to fill vacancies, and the appointment of committees, the convention proceeded to business. The committee on resolutions made the following report, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we approve and endorse the platform of principles enunciated by the Democratic State Convention; that we will heartily support the candidates nominated by the said convention:

Resolved, That we are in favor of a rigid economical administration of our county matters, in favor of low taxes, a strict accountability of public officers, and a proper protection by the State and General Government of our people and property against the bands of Indians that are now robbing and murdering our citizens and friends, and we will insist on such protection.

Resolved, That in the passage of the Civil Rights Bill over the veto of the President we recognize another attempt of the Radical majority in Congress to degrade the white man down to the level of the negro, and to centralize and usurp power; and that, believing as we do, that this Government was instituted for the benefit of the white race, we will oppose with all the energy we possess, and by all legal and constitutional means any and every attempt to give the right of suffrage to any other than the white man.

Resolved, That we are in favor of the restoration of the Southern States to all their civil rights, so soon as they comply with the requirements of the Constitution; that being the organic law of the land, we hold that Congress has no right to enforce any other laws than such as are in accordance with the Constitution; that we are in favor of the Union of the States one and inseparable as they were handed down to us by the apostles of the Revolution; that we will oppose their dismemberment, whether by the Radicals of the North or the extremists of the South, and that we hold with the immortal Jackson, that "the Union must and shall be preserved."

The Convention then proceeded to the nomination of candidates for the various offices in the county, which resulted as follows:

- For Representatives—O. Hamason and Frank T. Dodge.
- For Clerk—F. S. Holland.
- For Sheriff—A. W. Ferguson.
- For Treasurer—A. W. Buchanan.
- For Commissioners—G. F. Herbert and G. B. Gilman.
- For Assessor—Harrison Coram.
- For School Superintendent—E. P. Fitzgerald.
- For Surveyor—W. T. Newcomb.
- For Coroner—Dr. O. B. Brooks.

A resolution was adopted inviting Hon. Joseph S. Smith and Benj. Hayden to visit this county and address the people on the political issues of the day.

The Chair appointed James Fulton, G. F. Herbert and W. T. Newcomb to act as a Democratic Central County Committee.

On motion, the Mountaineer and Portland Herald were requested to publish the proceedings of this convention.

The convention then adjourned.

New Road.—Messrs. Crepin, Paxton and Tallister's Montana and Pacific Wagon Road, from this city to Mud Lakes, California, is now being lined out. It runs from Virginia, crossing the Stinkingwater (our friends would oblige the ladies by calling this river the "Rubicon") at Peter L-vreaux's Rancho, and passer over the Beaverhead, two miles above the Deer Lodge road, and passing over the Big Hole Divide, follows the course of that stream to near Fort Lemhi, where it turns southerly, by way of Salmon river, to Owyhee, Boise and Idaho City; from this locality, it goes nearly in an air line to California.—The road is straight and good, and will carry a great deal of the southwest traffic.—*Montana Post*
