still out of order beyond Salt Lake.
A meeting held last evening to organize a veteran corps composed of the officers and and soldiers residing on this coast, who have seen service in the late war, resulted in the appointment of a committee to wait upon the State military commission to ascertain if the corps can be equipped at the expense of the State. Forty persons signed the roll of mem-nership, and a committee of seven was appointed to obtain the signature of all veterans on this coust, irrespective of the States from which they entered the service.

In the county court yesterday, Dr. J. Grant, one of the losers by the Russ House robbery, applied to the court to have the money reand which was stolan by Mills. It transpired that \$8,000 in coir, besides a lot of bonds, in which Dr. Grant claimed no interest, had been recovered by detectives Lees and Ellis, and he claimed that his loss should be paid out of that amount. The matter was discussed at considerable length, and the court finally made an order directing that the money be paid to Mr. Pearson, of the Russ House, and that he might give Dr. Grant \$3 116 as his general average of the amount recovered .-The payment of this money, however, is not to prejudice his suit against the Russ House roprietors for the recovery of \$41,758 The latter parties claim that the proprietors should bear their proportion of the expense of the recovering of the money, while Dr. Grant holds that the house is responsible for the losses; consequently the recovery of the money is their gain, and as they are the ones who profit, they should pay expenses.

Vancouver, May 8.—Last night a drunken

row took place in the Mount Hool Saloon, which resulted in the death of Jack McDonmell, of Co. B., 14th Infantry. Sergeant Ingram, 1st Oregon Infantry, fired two shots in succession. The first taking effect in the groin, the latter through the arm and into McDonneil's breast, killing him instantly.— Corporal Prior, of Co. B. 14th Infantry, re-ceived a shot through the cheek. Prior's wound is not of a serious nature. Mr. Goldbeck, City Marshal, was nearly clubbed to death. There were five or six persons in the saloon when the row commenced. Chairs, gambling tables and everything in the shape of turniture and fixtures belonging to the saerloons are closed to day on account of the soldiers threatening to burn or tear down the saloon where McDonnell was killed.
