THE MUSSEL-SHELL ROADS.—We hasten to lay before our readers some additional facts connected with these important lines of communication with the river and the East. Messrs. Langford and Vivion have just returned after a thorough survey of the line from Helena to Muscle-Shell, going up White's Gulch, the party followed on through the hills for four days, locating the track. The pass over the Belt range is very easy. There is a gradual rise of nine miles, and no hill to prevent six yoke of ordinary cattle from drawing 6,000 pounds across the divide, without doubling. It is not more than sixty miles from Helena to the head waters of the Muscle-Shell, and from the summit of the range, the wooded hill, over the capital of Edgerton, and the direction of the Muscle-Shell are both visible. The road, at its greatest point of elevation, does not deflect 1 1/2 mile from an air line. There is a good company ferry over the Missouri. Along the whole road the feed, wood and water are magnificent, and in almost boundless quantities. Indeed, the freighter may safely calculate that detention on the road, or at the terminus, will fatten his cattle. From the headwaters of the Muscle-Shell to Kerocheval City is about one hundred and fifty miles through a glorious valley abounding in game with plenty of wood, water, and a smooth, level road. The road to Virginia City runs by the South fork of the Muscle-Shell by 25 Yard Creek and Gallatin. It is at least equally good, and not more than fifty miles longer than that to Helena. Parties can also follow the Helena road across the range, and then striking up and across the Missouri, at the ferry near Crow Creek, they can come by the Hot Springs route to Virginia, over the new chartered road. Mr. Brewer, the contractor, will have the roads ready for travel early in May, and this useful enterprise is thus put on a practical footing. *Montana Post*

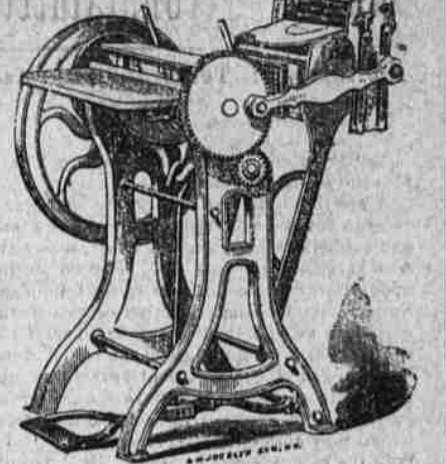
