The nurse performed her duty, and placed the two children in a crib, and went out of the room to minister the wants of the sick lady. The husband, after a short absence, returned and inquired for the strange child, when he was told it was lying in the crib. Thither he proceeded and discovered both infants. "Which one of these is mine?" he exclaimed, in an excited manner. The nurse was unable to say, and the doctor was in a similar fix. Here was a queer dilemma for the father of a family to be placed in. He could not send either of the children away for fear he might send his own instead of the one left on his door step. He did not relish having twins in this manner, but was compelled to submit to it. PRESENTMENT OF DEATH.—The *Sussex* (N. J.) *Register* relates a singular story of a citizen of Newton, in that State. 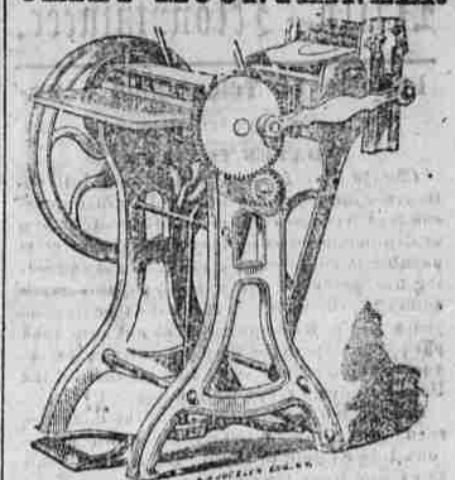
