## MONTANA NEWS.

From the *Radiator*, of the 21st ult., we take the following:

The Territorial Convention had adjourned *sine die*. A State Constitution was framed, based on the Constitutions, in part, of Missouri, Colorado and California. It is pronounced perfect in every respect. In it, slavery and involuntary servitude of any kind, save as a punishment for crime, is prohibited.

## THE MINES.

James Kennedy, expressman from Blackfoot City to McClelland Gulch, informs us that the gulches in that vicinity are turning out much better than the most sanguine expected. McClelland has been mined all winter. It affords good facilities for drifting, and in consequence of which much dirt has been washed during the winter. Lincoln gulch has proved a success; the gulch generally pays well. One party has been offered \$1,000 for a third of the dirt taken from one drift during the winter. Also, Keep Cool, as well as many others, is yielding freely.

Through various sources, we are informed that the Elk Creek mines are proving a success. Each trip of our expressman, Mr. Ennis, brings the glad tidings that all is hopefulness in that quarter. Many have commenced sluicing, and the returns for their labors are beyond their most sanguine expectations.

## FLOUR

## SHOOTING AFFRAY

Occurred at Elk Creek, between a man named Kelly, late of Helena, and a man named Loan, resulting in the death of the former. Loan attempted to escape, but was arrested and handed by the citizens. It seems that Loan had jumped Kelly's claim, and attempted to eject him from the same, when angry words ensued, and the men drew their weapons and commenced firing. This is the first affair of the kind at the new mines.

## BODIES FOUND.

The bodies of two men, supposed to be John Hanna and a man named Monroe, were recently found in the Flint Creek hills, where they had frozen to death. Hanna lived at Silver Bow, during last winter, and was originally from California.

## LARGE RUN.

The enormous sum of thirty thousand dollars was taken from a claim in McClelland gulch, lately, in eleven days, with five hands.

## EXTENT OF THE NEW DIGGINGS.

The new mines are proving of undoubted richness and great extent, at least three hundred miles of placer diggings having been found the past winter.

## ALL THE GULCHES TURNING OUT WELL.

Lincoln, Keep Cool, Reed's, California, Washington, Jefferson, Snowshoe, Ophir, Flint Creek, and all the others, are developing great riches.

## RANCHES IN THE VALLEY.

Deer Lodge Valley is almost entirely claimed. Ranches are held at high figures, and sell frequently at high prices. An improved rancho, situated near Deer Lodge City, was sold a short time since for \$5,000 in currency.

## CONTINUED EXCITEMENT.

The stampede increases. Everybody says he has found a "big thing."

A letter from Blackfoot City, to the *Post*, says:

The mines on Carpenter's bar and Prairie gulch are considered by many to be the best in the vicinity of this place, and extensive preparations are being made by the holders for the most advantageous working of their claims. I have no doubt but a large yield of gold will be the result of their energy. Besides, there are many smaller gulches and bars that will pay well. Several new discoveries, both east and west of Blackfoot, have been made during the winter, and between Snowshoe and Little Blackfoot creeks, two new districts have been found. A ditch has been surveyed, and, I understand, will be prosecuted to completion as early as possible, to convey the water sufficiently high to cover the new diggings. There is a large scope of country between these two streams that prospects well, and only remains unattended from the want of water to work the ground.

From No. 3 below discovery, on McClelland gulch, \$12,584 were taken out last week, the result of five days' run with one string of sluices. I am also informed that \$3,744 was cleaned up from a single day's run on the same claim, since. This, considering the disadvantages of working at this season of the year, is pretty good, even for Montana.
