DATES TO MAY 14.

Chicago, April 14.—The Senators elect from Colorado emphatically deny the imputation that there was a bargain and agreement to secure votes for the passage of the bill admitting Colorado, or that they promised their aid to the Congressional majority against the President, and they further say of their calls upon the President, which had excited the remark that they were pledging their support to him, was simply to present such facts and documents as would show the population, substantial wealth and permanent prosperity of Colorado, and had no reference whatever to politics.

San Francisco, May 15.—Gen. Mason writing to Gen. McDowell from headquarters at Sacalona, on the Gila, April 30th, says he has heard via Fort Yuma, of the massacre at Fort Goodwin, and that there is not a word of truth in the story. Sacalona is only four days travel from Fort Goodwin, and daily communication is kept up with headquarters.

Nevada City, May 15.—The San Juan stage with six passengers, was stopped this morning about half past four o'clock, by three robbers masked. They blew open Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasure box and took from it seven thousand nine hundred dollars. None of the passengers were robbed. As soon as the stage arrived in town word was sent to Sheriff Gentry, who immediately started with a posse in pursuit of the robbers. The posse separated near Mills' ranch, about three miles from town. Not long after separation Steve Venable, formerly City Marshal, got on their track and followed them to Myer's ravine, about two miles from where the robbery was committed. Just as he crossed the ravine he looked above on the hill-side, and about twenty five feet from him saw the head of one of the robbers, who was ready to fire. Steve leveled his Henry's repeating rifle and fired, the ball striking him in the left side near the nipple, killing him instantly. Robber No. 2 then raised his pistol to fire, but Steve being too quick for him, fired, hitting him under the right eye, killing him instantly. Robber No. 3 then started to run, when Steve fired, but missed. Fired again, the ball passed through his heart. Gentry and his posse secured all the treasure and deposited it in town. The coroner is now holding an inquest on the bodies. The robbers' names have not been ascertained.

We have received the first number of a new paper published in New York, called the *American Journal of Mining*, devoted exclusively to the mining interests of the country. From a glance through its columns we are satisfied that the journal is exactly what it represents itself to be, and not like the mining paper published in California, that knows of no mines outside of California and Nevada. Each of the mining States is allotted a part of the paper, where all that pertains to the interests of that section is fairly represented. We recommend this paper to the miners as a valuable journal devoted to their interests.—It is published at \$4 per year, payable in advance.

The Salt Lake *Vedette* is continually after the Mormons. Some time since it was reported in Salt Lake that Brig.-Gen. Connor was ordered to be mustered out of service, and to express their great joy at the event the Mormons got up a ball. When the report was contradicted, and it was announced that he had been promoted, the *Vedette* comes at Brigham's tribe in this style: "We advise the Happy Family, who recently celebrated the muster-out of the late Brig.-Gen. Connor by a ball at the Jubilee House, to have a day of humiliation and prayer in commemoration of his promotion and in view of the sudden blighting of their budding hopes. Make room for the mourners."

A PERSON, signing himself Jas. R. Tolles, advertised in the *Sacramento Bee*, recently, that he would give a lecture on eating, whereby a person can live comfortably on five cents worth of food per day, and bid defiance to Cholera or "any other disease."

He ought to be sent to Webfoot where the people eat about fifty cents worth of apples every day, and never miss a meal.

A TENNESSEAN, formerly a wealthy slave and land owner, now a resident of Arkansas, has notified Gen. Fiske of his intention to build school houses on his large plantation for the colored people, and requests to be supplied with teachers by the Freedmen's Bureau.
