A SERVANTS School is the latest idea in London. In it girls are trained to household work, cooking, washing and needlework.

An employee of the O. S. N. Co. at Umatilla, whose name we did not learn, committed suicide on Thursday last, by stabbing himself seven times in the side and once in the neck, with a pocketknife.

At the U. S. Arsenal at Watertown, Mass., about three hundred and sixty men are still engaged in the manufacture of iron gun carriages, of the Rodman pattern, designed for the thorough arming of the forts of our extensive coast, from the borders of Maine to the shores of California and Oregon.

One of the Government Revenue Detectives seriously informs the Commissioner of Customs that the Canada smugglers have laid pipes across the St. Lawrence river, and are engaged in pumping whiskey from Canada to the United States. He says he is searching for the spout.

AFTER THEM.—Marshal Keeler is a great barrier in the way of horse thieves in this section, and as a result it is getting to be very unhealthy for them to be about. The Marshal received information some time since of the theft of a horse from S. G. Rogers, of Grand Ronds, and being ever on the lookout for evil-doers, was informed the thief, named La Bchiere was around.—Mr. Keeler started on the scent and tracked him to Five Mile Creek. Last night about nine o'clock he made a descent on the camp, about a mile beyond the Five Mile House, arrested the thief and recovered the horse. He is now in jail awaiting an examination.

A SHOOTING AFFRAY occurred on Main street last Sunday afternoon, between William Baer and Frederick Zerrener, usually known as Vingar. Several shots were exchanged and a grand scattering of the crowd ensued. Vingar was slightly wounded in the wrist. The shooting was stopped by the intervention of the officers, the parties arrested, taken before Justice McGownd, and held to bail in the sum of \$500, each to appear to answer to the charge of assault with intent to kill. The case was set for Friday evening. The sureties of Baer are J. J. Kelly and S. A. Merritt; for Zerrener, Dr. Harris and D. Markham.—Idaho World.

A MERITED PROMOTION.—Our fellow townsman, Quincy A. Brooks, Esq., Special Agent for the Postoffice Department, has been promoted to be Special Mail Agent for the Pacific coast. His district will embrace California, Oregon, Washington Territory, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona, with headquarters at San Francisco, and with pay increased to the maximum allowed by law. Mr. Brooks is ordered to establish his headquarters in San Francisco by the 30th of June.—Oregonian

FLOURING MILL.—Mr. T. W. Emerson informs us that he will by the first of August have his new flouring mill, about fifteen miles below this city, completed, and of capacity to turn out fifty barrels of flour per day. Mr. Emerson is a practical miller of long experience, and possessed of energy that must succeed. We therefore look for a good mill. That is encouragement for farmers to raise wheat, with market for all the they can make, at their doors.—Idaho Statesman.

DEER LODGE.—A correspondent of the Montana Post, writing from Deer Lodge, says: The report that gained circulation, concerning the shooting affair at Elk creek, last week was incorrect. Kelly is still alive, and it is thought will recover; Loan has fled to parts unknown.

The mines are proving of great wealth; large numbers of quartz lodes have been discovered near Reynolds City, of a very superior quality. A man, whose name I have not learned, was hanged by the citizens of German Gulch, on last Friday afternoon, for attempting to murder his partner, by stabbing him. The wounded man, it is thought will recover.

It is said the party who followed the animals taken from Babington's about a week ago, were obliged to come back without success, after going about seventy miles. The Indians had too many hours the start. They found the carcasses of several mules that had been killed for a lunch, but could not overtake the band.—Idaho Statesman.

THE SHOOTING OF LIEUT. DUTCHER.—At about two o'clock this morning, Lieutenant Dutcher, 5th U. S. Infantry, the acting Provost-Marshal of the District, while going from the guard-house to his office, on Larimer street, he was approached by an unknown man who, without any warning discharged a pistol at him; this shot missed, when the Lieutenant drew a Derringer and fired; the would-be assassin again fired, approaching so near as to burn the clothes, the ball passing through the bowels, and lodging near the spine. He then ran down E street, and made his escape. Lieutenant Dutcher is lying in a very critical state, the physicians in attendance having very little hope of his recovery.—Denver (Colorado) News March 25th.

BIVEN'S GULCH.—We learn from an "honest miner" from that locality, that although this formerly rich gulch has been pronounced worked out, a rich harvest of the precious metal is expected, this season. Several well paying bars have been found, and the Gulch exhibits a lively appearance, at present; all hands making preparations for the summer's campaign.—Montana Post.
