DATES TO MAY 19.

Chicago, May 16.—There seems to be a hitch in the election of the United States Senator by the Connecticut Legislature.—The House on its part elected Gen. Ferry on the 16th, and the Senate was to have been called the next day, but the Senate postponed the election one week. Republicans from Washington say Ferry will certainly be headed off. He claims to have intelligence, which the Johnson men in Washington are very happy over, that three votes have been secured in the Connecticut Senate, sufficient to secure a dead-lock of the Scovill pattern. The report of the vote in the House incorrectly gave Foster 19 votes, it should have been 7—thus giving Ferry a majority in that body.

Chicago, May 19.—The Tennessee Senate yesterday rejected the resolution looking to the creation of East Tennessee as an independent State.

The Union State Johnson Convention of all who voted for Lincoln in 1859, and now support President Johnson, has been called to meet at Indianapolis on the 30th inst.

Washington, May 17.—In the Senate, the bill to prohibit the carriage, shipment or transportation of nitro-glycerine on passenger vessels or railroads, was passed. The Senate also passed a bill to grant lands in aid of the construction of a railroad from the Central Pacific Railroad in California, to Portland, Oregon.

Washington, May 19.—As the contract for the colonization of Lower California seems to be misunderstood, it may be of interest from official data, that Jacob P. Lease, with the endorsement of the local authorities, made a contract with the Mexican Government for the colonization of parts of Lower California. He was to receive land at a tariff of prices, and to advance certain sums of money as a part of the payment which it was agreed should be paid in San Francisco. This was afterwards changed so that the sum should be paid at New York, and was paid to Romero. The Mexican government therefore has sold some vacant lands, but not the sovereignty of the country.

New York, May 17.—A special dispatch to the evening papers says the President's message to-day, enclosing Gen. Grant's letter, asks for the immediate passage of a bill to increase the regular army. The Lieut. Gen. assigns as a reason for this request the fact that more troops are needed on the frontier and at the South. He also expressed the opinion that the troops cannot be withdrawn from the South with safety for some time to come.

The Columbia river at this point rose very rapidly on Saturday night, and on Sunday had reached the height of two feet above high water mark of last year. The cellars of several buildings on Main street were drowned out—in the Umatilla House cellar there was three feet of water. It rose at the rate of three inches an hour up to 2 o'clock p. m. yesterday, when it came to a stand.—From that time up to the present writing—2 o'clock p. m.—it has receded about one foot. All fears of high water the present season are now passed. The present cold weather will tend to check the melting of the snows until the present flood has had sufficient time to run out.

We noticed several men with skiffs engaged yesterday in catching drift-wood, which came down the river in large quantities. One man, at the upper end of Main street, must have got ten or fifteen cords, judging from the number of large logs which he had made fast to the shore. At the present rate at which wood is selling, this is a profitable business.

It is rumored that O'Meara and Hayden have given up all hopes of carrying a county in the great Willamette for their ticket, and hence their appearance in this section, to endeavor to accomplish what they cannot do below. The cards have already been shuffled and dealt up this way, and not a point made so far.

The "constituents" are becoming very anxious to hear from their would be representatives to the Legislature. Let the dear people have light on the "grave issues."—Come, gentlemen, let us hear from you.
