## Epitome of Telegraphic News.

Philadelphia, May 19.—The Academy of Music was crowded to night by an enthusias-tic audience to hear Senators Doclittle and Cowan on national issues. Doolittle declares that the man who denies the Union of the States under the Constitution, is himself a disunionist. He referred to the many calumnies that had been raised against the personal character of the President, and expressed the firm belief that no man living was more assiduously and consciencionsly engaged in the discharge of his duty to his country than Andrew Johnson. He illustrated the policy of President Lincoln, to show the policy of President Johnson was not a new one, but that it was in obedier ce to the wishes of the Union party, instead of the President proving false to the men who were leading the Union party and were preventing its grand objects and intentions—the restoration of the Union and coforcement of the law.

Cowan followed in an argument in defecse of sustaining laws by virtue of which the re-bellion had been crushed. The President's plan of reconstruction relies alone upon the authority of the Constitution and the law of the land. If the Southern people had not forgotten their allegiance to the Constitution, there would have been no rebellion. He was opposed to any ameadment to the Constitu-

tion at present.

New Fork, May 19.—During four months ending April 30th, 48,722 immigrants arrived, and since that date 17,901, making a total of 56,813. From this time forward the heaviest immigration of the year may be looked for, and the total is already estimated at 300,000. Whether the influence of the cholera will exert a checking or accelerating effect on immigration, is not taken into ac-

Resolved, That the veto by President John-son of the Civil Rights Bill, intelligence or which has been received since the adjournment of the State Union Convention, affords just cause to fear that the unhappy difference existing between the President and Congress is radical and irreconcilable.

Resolved, That we have implicit confidence

in the wisdom, patriotism and integrity of Congress, and in the ultimate success of its efforts to throw the safeguards of the law around the liberties of all the people of the United States, and secure to every man his rights in the courts of justice

Resolved, That justice, sound policy and the honor of the nation alike require that the recent adopted amendment to the Con-titution of the United States should be faithfully carried out, as well in spirit as in letter, and that this be done only through Congressional action; and that we regard any factious interference by the President with the Constitutional le istation of Congress apon this subject as opposition to the Constitution and encouragement to disloyaly, and a violation of his oaths and the nation's solemn and oft repeated pledges.

Resolved, That we are in favor of the States lately in rebellion being represented in Congrees by loyal men, and opposed to their being represented by men who are disloyal. Resolved, Tuat we heartily endorse the ac-

tion of those of our Representatives in Congress who voted for the passage of the bill known as the Civil Rights bill, and that we look to the President for a strict en orcement of the same, thereby securing to all equal and exact justice.

On motion that a report of the proceedings be published in the MOUNTAINERS and Orego man the Convention adjourned


