FROM OWYRES .- From the Avalanche of May 12th we condense the following :

The Oro Fine Company is now working sixty hands, and supplying sixty stamps with

The Silver Legion-owned by the Cosmos Co .- has been worked all winter. The melting snow has made water troublesome, but it is nearly free now. A splendidly working whim has been erected for hoisting ore and water, lowering timbers, &c., into the mine. The discovery ground of the Legion has passed into the Cosmos Co's. possession, at a large price, and it will be worked from two shafts. Considerable of the ore shows free metal. At the present works-1st South Extensionthere must be fully three hundred tons of pay ore taken out.

The Allison mine is being worked with a large force of men, under the superintendence of Capt. Prescott and control of the Lincoln Co. Three shifts of men are employed. The mine is being worked in the old tunnel and shaft, and a new tunnel is started two hundred feet south to strike the ledge at a different place. The way work is being pushed forward on this ledge it will not be many months before its true value will be established.

The rate of tax levied on real and personal property of Owyhee county for the year 1866, is \$2 35 on the \$100. This tax covers school, county and Territorial assessments.

Leading citizens of Silver and Ruby are favorably entertaining the proposition of abolishing the names Ruby and Silver and select a new one for both. It is proposed the new one be," Owyhee," and that boundaries be made that will include both towns.

HYDRAULIC. — Another of these mining agents is at work just below Bloom & Herd's lumber yard, washing down the bank with good prospects of making a "heap" of dust -the original make, too.

THE STEAMER FORTY-NINE .- A correspondent writes as from Colville, under date of May 5th, as tollows: "I left the Little Dalles on the steamer Forty-Nine, on the 16th day of April and saw the foot of Death Rapids on the moraing of the 25th. The steamer has proved a perfect success; she found no obsta-cles that she did not readily overcome. There was some little ice in the upper end of the lower lake, and about five miles of mush ice in the lower end of the upper lake. The river—from Little Dalles to the head of the Upper Dalles, a distance of about fifty miles from the mines-is as easy of navigation as the Columbia below the mouth of the Willamette; above that point, at extreme low water, the navigation is difficult. In going up the water was so low that the boat had to wait at the foot of some of the rapids for the water to raise. The snow on the banks above water to raise. The snow on the banks above the upper lake, we found from eighteen inches to two feet in depth, and I was told that the snow on the divide was from four to five feet deep, and very soft. The steamer will continue to run during the season between Little Dalles and Death Rapide. She left again on Monday, the 30th ult., taking about 30 tons freight and 82 passengers. On the first trip she took 15 tons freight and 75 passengers. first trip she took 15 tons freight and 75 passengers. The trip was made in 9 days up and 26 hours down-cutting her own wood.— W.

IMPORTANT DECISION.—A very important decision in relation to the powers of the United States Assessors, has just been rendered by Judge Smally, of the United States Circuit Court. A dispatch from Buffalo, N. Y., dated April 19th, announces that he decided in the case of Thomas Brown, of that city, that the Assessor has no right to region city, that the Assessor has no right to review any assessment made by him and which has been transmitted to the Collector and paid, and that the Assessor has no authority under the law to require any man to appear for examination in regard to such returns, nor compel him to submit his books for examin-ation, and that the Assessor's proceedings in all such cases are a nullity and without color of law. The inquisitorial powers exercised by Assessors have been regarded by many as unwarranted. It has been believed that they had no right, either in law or equity, to review assessments made and sworn to, much less to compel a man to reveal the secrets of his private business to a Federal officer, simply on the suspicion of fraud. If this decision holds, it will doubtless create a revolution in the manner of assessing and collecting the Internal Revenue .- Bulletin.


