COME FROM OUR GAZER.—The great Snake Chief, Palina, has skeddaddled. Uncle Sam's kind care and good living did not agree with him. This famous Indian surrendered himself about a year and a half ago to Captain Kelly, at Fort Klamath, where he had lived up to the present time. The object of his surrender was, no doubt to get his wife and child, who were captured about a month previously by a party who were returning from Fort Klamath, after making a treaty with the Klamath and Modoc Indians.—Madame Palina, with others who were then made prisoners, were taken to Fort Vancouver, where they were kept until last summer when they were restored to their liege lords. Had Palina been treated as he deserved, he would have been hung by the neck instead of being fed on Uncle Sam's rations. There is not an Indian east of the Cascade mountains who has committed more depredations on the whites than has Palina; nor is there one among the Snake tribes who has the influence of this chief. A year ago Superintendent Huntington treated with Palina and his band of Snakes, numbering about sixty warriors, by the terms of which they were compelled to remain on the Klamath Reservation. The disappearance of the whole band is only another proof of the regard Indians have for treaty stipulations. During the last four years this band of Indians has been a terror to the settlers on the line of the road to Canyon City. It was these same devils who fought and defeated a part of Capt. Drake's command three years ago, when Lieut. Watson was killed; and who almost every year visited the Warm Spring Reservation and helped themselves to such property as they could conveniently get off with. Palina will no doubt return to his old field of plunder—between here and Canyon City—and we would advise travelers on that road to keep a watchful eye to their stock and their scalps. The following is the paragraph from which we obtain the news, published in the *Sentinel*:

From a letter from Lieut. Oatman, written from Fort Klamath, we learn that Palina, the Snake Chief, with all of his "tillicums," has left this Indian Reservation, for parts unknown; it is believed by the Klamaths that he has gone to join Howlock. The Klamaths followed after him as far as Silver and Summer Lakes, and could find no trace of him. We would suggest to those traveling from Red Bluffs and Chico, through the Snake country, that it would be well for them to keep a sharp lookout for these freebooters.

JAS. O'MEARA, Democratic candidate for State Printer, addressed the citizens of this place last evening at the Democratic Club Room. There was nothing in his speech that has not been said by every Democratic candidate who has "spoke his piece" here since the canvass commenced. He left for Canyon City in the stage this morning.

FAY AND LANE have issued a "prospectus" to the citizens of Grant county, asking subscription (votes) to enable them to sell the people of Eastern Oregon to Portland. The man who votes for Fay or Lane, in this or adjoining counties at the coming election, is voting against the real interests of this section, for if elected, they will surely sell to the highest bidder.

The stage from Canyon City arrived here last night about midnight. The driver reports having seen two Indians on the road, but had heard of no depredations lately. The miners were all at work and doing well. The political canvass goes on lively.

WARM.—To-day has been the warmest day of the season, such as to cause all nature to smile and be glad. We would suggest that those who have ice stored up bring it out and let it cool—no insinuations.

ELECTION LAWS.

The following are the laws which will govern the election in this State next month:

SECTION I. That at all general and special elections held in this State, it shall be the duty of the judges of such election to administer the following oath to any person offering his vote, unless the person so offering to vote is known to one or more of said judges to possess the qualifications therein set forth, viz:

You, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you are a citizen of the United States, twenty-one years of age, and have resided in the State of Oregon six months immediately preceding this election, and ninety days in the district and county immediately preceding the election, and you know of no lawful disqualification that you possess; and that you will support the Constitution and laws of the United States, and the Government of the United States against all enemies, whether foreign or domestic, and will bear true faith, allegiance and loyalty to the same, any ordinance, resolution or law of any State Convention or Legislature to the contrary notwithstanding; and that you have not voted in any other county or precinct at this election. So help you God if an affirmation, the words, "under the pains and penalty of perjury," shall be added.

In case the applicant is of foreign birth, and the foregoing oath is not applicable, the following oath, in lieu of the foregoing, shall be administered:

You do solemnly swear that you are twenty-one years of age, and have resided in the United States one year, and in the State of Oregon during the six months immediately preceding this election, and have declared your intention to become a citizen of the United States, one year preceding this election, conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, and have bona fide resided in the district and county ninety days next preceding this election, and that you know of no lawful disqualification that you possess; and that you will support the Constitution and laws of the United States, and the Government of the United States against all enemies, whether foreign or domestic, and will bear true faith, allegiance and loyalty to the same, any ordinance, resolution or law of any State Convention or Legislature to the contrary notwithstanding; and that you have not voted in any other county, district or precinct at this election. So help you God. (Or if an affirmation, to conclude as in the first oath.)

SEC. 3. If any person applying to vote, is challenged by a lawful voter, the judges of election shall administer one of the foregoing oaths or affirmations to the said applicant, before he shall be allowed to vote.

SEC. 5. If any person or persons shall, by menace, threat or violence, whether armed or unarmed, intimidate or prevent, or attempt to intimidate or prevent, any person from challenging another voter, or to prevent any person from voting, such person or persons so offending shall, upon conviction, be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary, not less than one, nor more than three years.

That section 1, of title I, of an act entitled "an act relating to elections and the mode of supplying vacancies in office," passed January 29, A. D. 1854, shall be so amended as to read as follows, viz: That all white male inhabitants over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within this State for six months next preceding an election, or have declared their intention to become citizens of the United States according to the provisions of the Constitution, shall be entitled to vote for Presidential electors, Representatives to Congress, State, district, county and precinct officers. *Provided*, That ninety days bona fide residence in a county next preceding an election shall be required to entitle a person to vote for county and precinct officers, and likewise ninety days preceding such election in a district for district officers.

Approved October 11, 1864.

BODY FOUND.

COLLINS' LANDING, W. T., May 23, 1866.

EDITOR MOUNTAINEER:—The body of a drowned man was found yesterday about three miles above this place, on the Washington side of the Columbia. It appeared to have been in the water about two weeks; was about five feet ten inches high and was about thirty or thirty-five years of age. The body had on light cassimere pants, white drawers, calf boots, with large caps over the front, part of a grey overshirt and a figured leather belt around the waist; a little dark hair on the back of the head and a light goatee, and had the appearance of having had small whiskers. It was buried by Coroner Shepherd of Skamania county.
