TREASONABLE ORGANIZATION IN LINN COUNTY.

READ! READ! READ!

The following letter, divulging the plans and purposes of the treasonable organization which the Democrats maintained during the war in Linn county, is published in the Albany Journal, of the 18th inst. The writer is well known throughout the State, and has a reputation for honesty and veracity:

ALBANY, May 16th, 1866.

It is with deep feelings of duty that I owe to myself, my country, and my God, that I pen these lines for publication. I have been frequently inquired of to know the reason why I left the so-called Democratic party; and that all may know my reasons, I here solemnly declare that I left that party because I became convinced by proof undeniable that its leaders were men who are in favor of the South, and enemies to the Government. They say this is not so. I say that I know it to be so. I have kept the means of my knowledge to myself, but I can keep it no longer; and though it is a heavy task, I feel it my duty to let the world know the facts I shall state. I cannot say certain what name the organization went by, but I do know that the object of said organization (I will here say that I do not feel bound by any oath that may have been given when that oath would bind me to hold my peace and let traitors destroy my country; I have weighed well this matter,) was to destroy our country, for they did not instruct me to resist the draft, and if I should be drafted how to let their friends of the rebel army know I was their friend so that I need not fear them or they me. When in the army, they are to bite off their cartridges, let the ball fall to the ground, and give their ramrod a certain flourish; then run down the powder without the ball, then hold their guns across the left wrist so that their friends may know who they are. When I say their friends I mean the rebel army for loyal men would not understand their signs. Such are the men who are running for office on the Democratic ticket, professing love for their country. Oh, what love! I make these statements in full view of the responsibility I incur, believing that some honest Democrats will see with whom they are associating, and for whom they are about to cast their votes.
