A NEW YORK LADY BECOMES AUNT TO A BRITISH PRINCESS.—A Paris letter of March 28th, to the New York Times, contains the following interesting bit of gossip:

Of course you know that the Princess Helen, third daughter of Queen Victoria, is soon to espouse the German Prince Christian, of Augustenburg; but perhaps you do not know that this marriage will make a Princess of the royal family of England a niece to a lady in New York, whose maiden name was Lee. The relationship is very easily explained. Some years ago—seven or eight, if my memory serves me correctly—there resided in Paris a New York family of the name of Lee, one of the daughters of which was married in the United States Minister's (Judge Mason's) house, to Baron Wachter, Minister of Wurtemberg. This lady's sister, some years subsequently, met Prince Frederic, brother of the reigning Duke of Augustenburg-Glucksburg, who fell desperately in love with her. The princely swain of the young Manhattanese was not precisely the *beau ideal* one is accustomed to encounter in novels, and was, in sober fact, an antiquated Celadon, or past sixty, and a widower at that, his first wife, who belonged to the royal family of Denmark, having died in 1858. The Prince was, however, so deeply enamored of Miss Lee that he renounced all pretensions to the Crown, (a necessary preliminary to contracting what even the most insignificant "sovereign families" of Europe regard as a *mesalliance*), and the marriage was duly solemnized, as before, at the Legation of the United States. Immediately afterward, the happy pair set out for the East on their wedding tour; but the fatigues of the journey were too great for the bridegroom of sixty, and upon arriving at Beirut, Syria, he quietly gave up the ghost, whereupon his bereaved widow, the Princess, returned to Paris, and took up her residence with her sister, the Baroness Wachter. And this is how a New York lady became aunt to the Princess Helen of Great Britain.

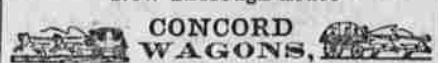

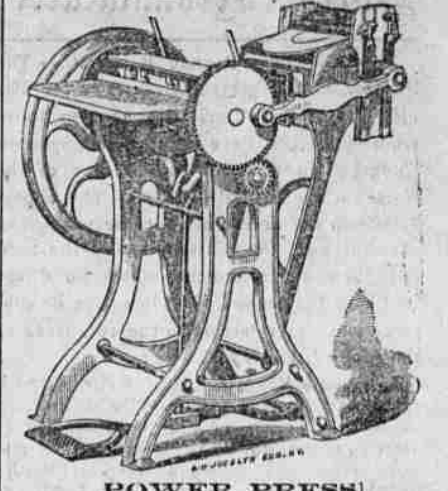
