MONTANA NEWS.

From the Radiator, of May 5th, we take the following items, from Elk Creek diggings:

J. W. Keenan, with four men, is cleaning up from \$130 to \$250 per day, to the sluice, in the main creek; Johns, with same force, from one to two hundred. The claim on Bilk Gulch, in which Charley Marden is interested, yielded \$680 with one rocker, one day last week.

Al. Peacock is making good wages in Day's Gulch; Peter, the whilom devil in the Radiator office, has gone far down the creek, and thinks he has twelve dollar diggings. There are thousands of others whose prospects I am not posted on.

Pritchert and Barlow's train, which left Umatilla Oct. 14th, arrived here yesterday, being out six months and ten days. They wintered on Horse Prairie, and lost twenty-four horses.

John Hildreth has found a ledge of good looking rock, well defined, and many feet thick, beyond the Billy Weasel.

A stampede took place last night. "Oregon John" and Frank Trumble were prospecting on Saturday, near the head of Deep Gulch, when John fell down on the crust of the snow and broke through. Taking the circumstance for a lucky indication they sunk a hole and found good prospects; hence the stampede.

More gold has been exhibited during the week than is usual in this town. Many coarse pieces have been picked up. Wheelock & KeBride picked up \$100 or over in lumps in the ground sluice. Charley Marden's claim has paid between six and seven thousand dollars within two weeks.

Dunlap & Hubbell have started a storage and commission house in town. The packers all know "Jack," and they will do well.

TOWN SITES.

Fairchild has laid out a city at the mouth of the Joeko in the name Savage, Abrams, & Co., and calls it Joeko City. The same firm, through the same agent, will establish another town at the Pen d'Oreille Falls, and another at Cabinet Rapids, and secure the portages at those places.

THE FENIAN FARCE.—The New York correspondent of the Bulletin, in his letter of April 20th, says:

If your correspondent has had little or nothing to say about Fenianism, it was because he had no faith that the movement would result in any benefit to Ireland by means of what the organization would actually do. The grand conspiracy has already passed its zenith of popularity—has lost all dignity of character, and fallen to the grade of a very pretty farce. For months the Fenian organs have been full of Proclamations or Pronouncements of the Bombastes Furiosos order—but nothing comes of them all. A fortnight ago it was announced that the advance of the host which is to invade and capture Canada had actually started—and a Fenian ship left the coast of Maine a little more recently on a "secret expedition." But to this hour we hear nothing of this "Fenian navy" on the Northeast coast—while the "Army of Invasion" has summed up its results in the capture of a British Revenue flag, taken by five armed Fenians from a single Provincial officer whom they encountered at an isolated point just over the border! The American public generally, and the better informed classes among our Irish population as well, are rapidly coming to the conclusion that this whole business of Fenianism has degenerated into a simple swindle, by which to extort money from people who can ill afford to part with it, but who cannot resist the appeal to their patriotism.

COLVILLE ITEMS.—Under the impulse of the Big Bend excitement, Colville has become a place of considerable activity and gives signs of improvement. One of the indications of progress is the erection of a large hotel by Dr. I. L. Tobey, which will be a great accommodation to the travelling public. Catching the spirit of the times, the farmers of the Valley have "seeded" much larger quantities of grain this spring than usual. The report that the soldiers at Fort Colville had deserted and gone to the mines is without foundation.—The deserters, all told, foot up nine men.—W. W. Statesman.

CRICKETS.—We are told that the crickets are making their appearance in vast numbers in different sections of the valley. In some localities they are so numerous that the farmers fear they will greatly injure, if not entirely destroy their crops. They are said to be, by far, more plentiful than they have been any former season, since the settlement of the valley. They are not yet more than half grown, and it will require a month to determine whether the fears in regard to their destroying crops are to be realized.—W. W. Statesman.
