## WHO HAS FAVORED NEGRO SUFFRAGE.

President Johnson, whom the Democracy hypocritically profess to endorse, said that if he was in Tennessee he would endeavor to have the negroes vote. On the 15th of August, 1865, he wrote a letter to Governor Sharkey, of Mississippi, in which he used this language:

"I am gratified to see that you have organized a convention without difficulty, and hope that without delay the convention will amend the State Constitution, abolishing slavery, and deny future Legislatures power to make property in man. If you could extend the elective franchise to all persons of color who can read the Constitution and write their names, and to all persons of color who own real estate valued at not less than \$250 and pay taxes thereon; you would completely disarm the adversary, and set an example that other States will follow. This you can do with perfect safety, and you will thus place the Southern States, in reference to persons of color, upon the same basis with the States. I hope and trust your convention will do this."

The Democratic party gave the negroes the right to vote in New York, and that State has been under the control of that party much of the time since, yet the provision has not been changed. Martin Van Buren took an active part in extending the right of suffrage to the negroes, and his acts were approved by the Democratic party in electing him President.

Negroes voted in Delaware for fifty-five years. In North Carolina for sixty years. In Georgia for over sixty-two years. In Tennessee for forty years. In Maryland for thirty-two years.

Parson Brownlow says: "My recollection is that in every Southern State, except South Carolina, the right of suffrage was originally exercised by free blacks. The original Constitutions of Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and Georgia, members of the old thirteen, make no mention of color in defining the qualifications of voters. Up to the time of the adoption of the amended Constitution, in 1835, negroes voted in Tennessee, and the leading politicians of the State importuned them for their votes. In Maryland they voted until 1833, and in North Carolina they voted as late as 1835.—Oregon Statesman.

### TO THE PUBLIC.

Mr. S. S. Markham publishes the following letter in the Albany Journal, of the 25th instant:

ALBANY, May 24th, 1866.

Having been informed that it is being reported that I have retracted the statements which were published in the Albany Journal, of May 18th, over my signature, exposing the schemes of the treasonable organization into which I was initiated in the office of Cranor & Helm, in the town of Albany, I deem it my duty to publicly pronounce such report false. The statements contained in my communication in the Journal, above referred to, I here reiterate. They are true, and I will make affidavit to them if necessary. *George R. With all the evidence now before the public, proving the existence of this treasonable order in Oregon, I am surprised that some have attempted to make it appear that Mr. Helm was merely perpetrating a little joke upon me. I know and Mr. Helm and others know that the meeting I attended was earnest, plotting and treasonable, if voluntarily going over to the enemies of our country upon the field of battle is treason.

We hereby certify that we have been personally acquainted with Mr. S. S. Markham, many of us for a period of fifteen years, and he has borne the reputation of an honest, truthful and upright man. We know him to be in every way worthy of confidence and belief: J. H. Foster, A. Anan, John Smith, G. H. Baker, J. Menlenhall, Milton Hale, D. Froman, E. H. Griffin, D. Beach, B. R. Freeland, D. H. ### Ordinance No. 39.

AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dallas City do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dallas City, shall therefor procure a License from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious misrepresentations shall injure, or attempt to injure any Hotel, Restaurant or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a license therefor, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in the sum of twenty dollars.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 21 day of June, 1866.
