Martin Van Buren took an active part in extending the right of suffrage to the negroes, and his acts were approved by the Democratic party in electing him President.

Ordinance No. 39.

AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dalles City do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dalles City, shall therefor procure a Liceuse from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

SEC. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious, misrepresentations shall injure, or a tempt to injure any Hotel, Rostaurant or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any num not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

SEC. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a licease therefor, shall, on convic-tion thereof, be punished by a five in the sum of twenty dollars.
