WILL ADDRESS THE CITIZENS OF DALLES CITY,
THIS EVENING,

At 8 o'clock p. m., on the corner of Washington and Second streets, opposite French & Gilman's.

A "JONES" CONVICTED.—At the candidate's meeting at Aurora the other day, Samuel Brown, a candidate on the Union ticket for State Senator, charged L. M. Savage the Copperhead candidate, with being a member of the assassinating Democratic secret league of "Old Guards."

Mr. Savage fiercely denied it and demanded the proof.

Mr. Brown called on a well known gentleman in the crowd to testify what he knew of the matter. He arose, and turning upon Savage, said elaborately:

"You told me in the presence of my mother that you belonged to the 'Old Guard' or 'Jones Family,' and that the Democrats were organized all over this State for the purpose of resisting the draft and to resist military arrests—that you were ready for them [Union men] if they attempted to make any more arrests."

He slunk out of it like a whipped spaniel and retired, probably to counsel with the "Jones Family," which, there is good reason to believe, is now in full organization in various parts of the State.—Oregonian.

Ordinance No. 39.

AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dalles City do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dalles City, shall thereupon procure a License from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious misrepresentations shall injure, or attempt to injure any Hotel, Restaurant or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a License therefor, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in the sum of twenty dollars.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 2d day of June, 1866.
