EASTERN NEWS.

Chicago, May 23.—Secretary Seward made a speech at Auburn, New York, last night saying: "The National life lately hung on the issues of victory won in war. It still hangs on the issues of reconciliation and peace. The nation must live. It must live forever whether it receives the needed care in any exigency at the hands of our present Congress, or party, or at the hands of another. I agree that it is more desirable that the work so happily begun and so successfully prosecuted shall be continued, and indeed under the auspices of the National Union party, and of the President and Congress as representatives of that party. I agree, therefore, that would be a sad misfortune if the divergence between the President and Congress should work the decline and downfall of the National Union party. Both the President and Congress might be expected to be equally involved in the calamity which should dismiss the Union party from the National Councils, and see with mortification the great responsibility to which the party had in that case, prove itself unequal; and the duties which must then be assumed and discharged by some new and yet undeveloped political organization. But the President, Congress, statesmen and parties are of no avail when we weigh them against the national life. What then does the nation need? It needs reconstruction, and just needs nothing more. Let reconstruction be made first rather in Congress than in any of the constituencies, and it will follow in the other place. The country exhibits at this moment this extraordinary and interesting phenomena of States, and not only kindred but allied, yet hostile to each other. For such a condition, reconciliation is the only practical remedy. What hinders the application of that remedy in the legislative councils. The President's position is absolutely, so taken and universally understood. We cannot require less than this. We cannot require more, because then if more were desirable, that more is debatable, and must be the study and work not of ourselves at this particular period, but of ourselves and our successors hereafter.

The President and Cabinet were serenaded to-night by National Club. Secretary Stanton-being called upon at his residence, read a speech from a manuscript. He had been in favor of qualified negro suffrage and the organization of the Southern States, by calm and full discussion. He yielded to the universal arguments resting upon the practical difficulties, and to be encountered in such measures, and to the President's conviction that to prescribe rules of suffrage was not within the legitimate scope of his power. Concerning, however, in the objects of the Freedmen's Bureau bill, and regarding the power therein conferred as temporary and in safe hands, he avowed its approval; but having been returned to Congress with the President's objections, and having failed to receive the necessary support, it is no longer a living measure nor the subject of debate. Without giving his personal views thereon, the Secretary took up the Congressional plan of reconstruction. He declared he had been able to give his assent, particularly that referring to the proposed disfranchisement until 1870. He said the elements of change are at work in the South, stimulating one side to loyalty and the other to continued hostility. In his judgment, every incitement to union should be cherished. The President and other Secretaries made only brief acknowledgments.
