## STAND AT THE POLLS.

Let the Union men see to it that the polls are well guarded, and that none but qualified voters are allowed to vote. Challenge all votes you have doubts about, and protest against those that you know to be fraudulent. Do not be intimidated by threats from challenging any person your suspicion. The law protects you in it. The following is the law which governs elections:

If any person or persons shall, by menace, threat or violence, whether armed or unarmed, intimidate or prevent, or attempt to intimidate or prevent, any person from challenging another voter, or to prevent any person from voting, such person or persons so offending shall, upon conviction, be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary, not less than one, nor more than three years.

That all white male inhabitants over the age of twenty-one years, who shall have resided within this State for six months next preceding an election, or have declared their intention to become citizens of the United States according to the provisions of the constitution, shall be entitled to vote for Presidential electors, Representatives to Congress, State, district and precinct officers. *Provided*, That ninety days *bona fide* residence in a county next preceding an election shall be required to entitle a person to vote for county and precinct officers, and likewise ninety days preceding such election in a district for district officers.

From Richmond, I went down the James River to Fortress Monroe. On the way, objects of interest were pointed out—Fort Darling, Butler's Dutch Gap Canal, Harrison's Landing, City Point, Jamestown, the first white settlement in the New World, Newport News, etc. Upon introduction, I obtained a pass to enter the Fortress, where I had not been many hours, when I met the great rebel chief face to face, while he was taking his usual daily walks on the ramparts under the escort of an officer by his side and two armed soldiers behind him; and I had a good view of him as he passed me. He was well dressed, had a light colored, felt hat, and new boots. His eye was clear and bright, his step firm, and his bearing as proud as a Roman conqueror. He is indulged in this recreation every day, and is apparently cheerful and free from care. During these walks he frequently recites scraps of Latin and Greek poetry—He is privileged with the use of the fine library of the Fortress, and is permitted to write, of course under the inspection of the commanding officer.

He is a great smoker, and when in his apartment employs his time in writing, reading and praying. Alternately he is very quiet and pious, and restive and boisterous. He freely expresses his opinions about the Generals and leaders on both sides. He thinks McClellan was our greatest General, and says Grant is no soldier, nothing but a butcher; Lincoln was a good natured man, but a jack-ass; Andrew Johnson is pretty smart, and inclined to do the fair thing so far as he can, but he is not a great man.

He thinks his capture was unjust, as he was fairly paroled by the surrender of Lee and Johnson, and says that if he had had any idea of being taken he could easily have made his escape. He was terribly enraged at what Foote, of Mississippi said of him, and declared Foote a "constitutional liar"—that he "had often told him so;" said he was glad when he escaped from the Confederacy, and that he "gave orders to let him go and not stop him;" adding, "I was glad to get rid of such a nuisance."

"The Duke of Marlborough," Jeff says, "deserted his sovereign—fought successfully under the banners of another Prince, and his name has come down in history as one of the noblest men and greatest of Generals of his time. But Marshal Ney, one of Napoleon's famous Generals, who, after the banishment of Napoleon to Elba, gave in his adhesion to the ruling powers, and again joined his chief on his return, was, after his final overthrow, taken and shot as a traitor."

His commentary upon these historic facts was this: "Treason never prospers—for when it does, none dare call it treason."

It is of no consequence to any one to know from what source or by what means I derived my information concerning the sayings and doings of this bold, bad man. I can only say the recital is perfectly true, and to be relied upon.—*Correspondence of an Eastern Paper.*

**Ordinance No. 39.**  
AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dalles City do ordain as follows:  
Section 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dalles City, shall thereupon procure a License from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious misrepresentations shall injure, or attempt to injure any Hotel, Restaurant or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a license therefor, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in the sum of twenty dollars.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 24 day of June, 1866.
