EASTERN NEWS.

Washington, May 29.—The Commit-tee on Ways and Means, after holding daily sessions for two months, are taking a short rest before completing the revision of the tariff, which they have not as yet discussed only in a general way. A comparison of opinions leads however to the belief that few important changes will be made other than those required to harmonize the tax on imports with the internal tax as imposed by the bill just passed by the House. It is possible that additional protection will be given to some articles, but there is ground to believe that the wool and iron interests which are clamorous for heavy

duties, will be disappointed. Washington, May 30.—The Senate took up the Constitutional amend-

ment.

Mr. Doolittle moved to amend the first section by inserting the words "Indians not taxed."

Mr. Cowan thought it belonged to the States to say who are citizens. Mr. Johnson said very serious questions had arisen, and some of them had given rise to much embarrassment as to who are citizens of the United States, and what are the rights which belong to them. The object of the amendment was to settle the question. He thought the committee to whom the subject was referred, and by whom the report had been made, had acted wisely in defining what citizenship is. He knew of no better way of accomplishing that than the one adopted by the committee. Mr. Johnson then passed to the amendment of Mr. Door little, and expressed bimself in favor of it. He (Mr. Johnson) hoped that the friends of the joint resolution would adopt it.

Mr. Howard said that the great objection to Doolittle's amendment was that its effect would be to naturalize all Indians who paid taxes. Mr. Doo. little says the words to his amendment were in the Civil Rights Bill, in a provision similar to that which now was proposed as a constitutional amendment. The Civil Rights Bill undertook to do the same thing which is now in progress here, declaring who shall be citizens. This declaration of Congress was without validity unless . a constitutional amendment should be brought forward to enforce it. Therefore, he professed to report this amend. ment.

Mr. Fessenden said such doubts were never expressed in the committee of 15. During all the discussion in the committee, the subject was not mentioned.

Mr. Grimes said that Mr. Doolittle's charges was not only an imputation upon the committee, but upon every Senator who voted for the Civil Rights Bill.

After some remarks by Mr. Saulsbury, the ayes and noes were demanded upon the adoption of Doolittle's amendment to insert the words mentioned. Disagreed to; ayes, 10; noes,

The Secretary of War to-day sent to the House the report of Gen. Stoneman on the Memphis riots. Stoneman says the investigation shows, 24 negroes killed, 8 of whom were dischrged soldiers.

New York, May 30 .- Suspicious Fenian movements lead to the belief that Gen. Sweeney is on the war path, and means mischief. Bodies of armed Fenians are reported leaving Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Cleveland and other points on the Canada border.
